Staff Moves to Carling Block On Monday.

DEPOT NEEDED ROOM

Change Forced by Demands of New Organization for Handling Returned Men.

The London mobilization centre will be moved from the Armories to the Carling block on Richmond street, north of Carling street, on Monday.

Arrangements have been under way for the move for some time, and it will be made with as little inconvenience to the staff of the mobilization centre as possible.

The move has become necessary, owing to the demands for space made by the new district depot for returned soldiers in the Armories. This new unit, handling, as it does, all the returned men in Western Ontario who have not been discharged, is one of immense proportions, and requires much office space for its various company, section, headquarters, paymaster's, quarter-master's

Since the beginning of the war, nearly four years ago, volunteers have made the Armories their mecca, and it will seem somewhat strange for men wishing to sign up to seek the Richmond street offices. Through the gateway of the local mobilization centre all the nen, whether draftees or volunteers, both from the United States and Can-ada, gain entrance to khaki-land, re-ceive their medical examinations, and have their documents made out, and it is important that suitable quarters be is important that suitable quarters be secured for it. The Richmond street property is being fixed up with this purpose in view.





NO APPARENT TRUCE MOVES

Linemen of Utilities Commission Still Off Work Because of Wage Dispute.

SAY \$1.00 HOLDS IT UP

Figures Quoted to Show Demands Only Exceed Manager's Offer by That Sum.

No steps whatever have been taken to bring about a settlement of the dispute between the utilities commission and its triking linemen since the men refused Thursday to return to work under

the old agreement.

The men are still out. There have been no desertions from their ranks, they say. They have modified their demands somewhat, having informed the utilities that they were willing to accept an increase of 2½ cents an hour. To this offer the commission has not replied in one way or another, say the men. The men contend that their offer of a settlement for 2½c would exceed only by one dollar the increases which Manager E. V. Buchanan offered to four of the men. Two of the four men who were offered an increase by Mr. Buchanan just prior to the strike were drawing \$24.30 a week and the other two \$22.95. The first man was offered \$28, second \$27, and the last two \$26 a week, or a total increase of \$12.50 a The ten men who are on strike \$13.50 a week. In other words, more than what Mr. Buchanan was willing to give four men to satisfy them would satisfy the whole ten.

thing for which the commission receives alue. The majority of the men say hey are not anxious for the overtime. lowever, under the straight salary the strike continues


