The recommendation for the chlorinating plants will be sent again to the commission as a result. Protection for the collecting ponds at Springbank, through the construction of concrete walls to keep out surface wash, will also be asked for.

The appointment of Miss Blanche D. Friend as public health nurse at a salary of \$1,200 a year was recommended to the council.

The excellent germination of seed corn has been a surprising feature of the season, as so much soft corn had been complained of last year. In some of the Lake Erie counties the crop has already received one or more cultivations, and is considered to be very forward in growth. In the same district sugar beets and mangels have already been thinned. Potatoes are also well advanced, and are receiving attention. Essex reports some early cabbage on the market, and in Kent and Norfolk strawberries have been sold at 30c a quart.
