Normandy Fish Pie-Boll any whit is the usual way, drain and flake it. Have ready a good cream sauce, season well and add the juice of an onion. Line a deep pie plate with good crust, turn fish and sauce into it, put on top crust and bake until the crust is deep season. is done. Serve hot.

Lobster Pie—Take the meat of two cold boiled lobsters and cut in small, pieces. Make a rich Newburg sauce, and put the lobster in it with half a cupful of fried bread crumbs and a cupful of steamed soft clams. Line a deep pie dish with good paste, fill with the lobster mixture and put on the top crust. Bake until crust is done. Serve hot and save enough of the sauce to serve with the pie.

Haddock and Mussels—Lav a large

Haddock and Mussels—Lay a large slice of haddock on a buttered baking dish, cover it with a layer of boiled and bearded mussels, pour over a little rich, smooth and well-seasoned tomato sauce. Lay on another slice of fish, then a layer of mussels, dot with butter, dust with pepper and a few crumbs. Turn over a little of the sauce and hake.

Roe Tarts—Put the fish roe, milts also if they are to be had, on in cold water and boil ten minutes. Drain, Scale, cut of the heads, open and clean the inside, then dust with pepper, salt and wrap in a wet linen cloth. Place beside the ice until ready to cook. For broiling, rinse, oil over, put on tie in a cloth and put on to boil in cold water, boil from 10 to 30 minutes, oven.




