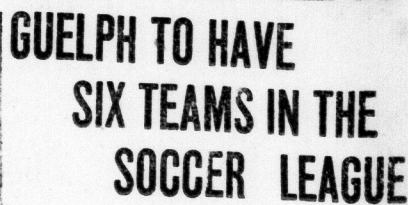


THE SPORTING SECTION
