SERIOUS SHORTAGE OF COAL AT GUELPH

Some Factories May Be Forced To Close Down.

GUELPH, May 27.—The soft coal shortage has become so acute that Mr. Griffith, a representative of the fuel controller's department of Ontario, was here today to make an effort to relieve the situation. Several of the factories will have to close down at an early date if a coal supply is not received at once, while at the waterworks plant, has been necessary to burn wood in order to keep the pumping system in operation. The gas plant is also very short of coal and the situation generally is regarded as very serious.

SUPERANNUATION MEASURE GETS BIG MAJORITY

Efforts of U. F. O. Headquarters To Kill Bill Have Little Effect.

SEVEN GOVT. BOLTERS

Three Liberal Farmers Also Vote For Cridland's Six Months' Hoist.

TORONTO, May 27.—A division on the civil servants' superannuation bill in the Legislature today resulted in a victory for the Government. A motion by J. Cridland, U.F.O., South Norfolk, to give the bill a six months' hoist was defeated by 64 votes to 19, and thus the efforts of J. J. Morrison, secretary of the United Farmers of Ontario, through various U. F. O. clubs to have the bill killed signally failed. However, seven farmer members voted to kill it: J. Cridland; J. M. Webster, West Lambton; J. W. Widdifield, North Ontario; R. N. McArthur, West Wellington; H. McCreary, North Lanark; L. W. Oke, East Lambton; and John Carty, South Renfrew. The following trio of Liberals completed the ten who voted for the Cridland motion, these also being farmers: J. A. Calder, North Oxford; A. P. McWhinney, West Lambton; and J. M. Govenlock, Centre Huron.

The civil servants' superannuation bill was given its final reading when the Cridland motion failed to carry. The bill to establish a minimum wage board to regulate wages for women and girls, and to investigate trades and occupations where women or girls are considered underpaid, was given its third reading.

Premier Drury's bill to give municipalities local option in passing bylaws for the exemption from taxation of improvements, business and incomes also received its third reading. Provision is made in the bill for the repeal of the local option bylaw by any municipality if the new law should be found unconstitutional.

WANTS MORE NICKEL REFINED IN ONTARIO

TORONTO, May 27.—R. Cooper (Welland), today asked the Government if it could not have more Ontario nickel refined within the province. He stated that the plant at Port Colborne was running at about one-third capacity. Two thousand more men could be employed if the plant were running full capacity. Hon. H. Mills, minister of mines, said that one-third of the Ontario nickel was refined in the province, and the remainder went to New Jersey.

CRITICISM GIVEN SCHOOL TEXT BOOKS

TORONTO, May 27.—Ontario public school text books came in for severe criticism today, especially those of the "cat, rat, hat" variety. Thomas Marshall (Lincoln), referred to some of them as the "driest and driest possible." He thought it time to shake up the dry bones.

Hon. Manning Doherty, minister of agriculture, agreed. He thought it would be a good thing to perpetuate the stories of gallant Canadian service in the war, but also the stories of those other heroes in Canadian life—the early pioneers.

Incidentally the question of free text books came up. Mr. Dewar said the Government should be honest with the people, and because it sold text books at 10 cents should not pretend that the cost of the cost did not come out of the people.

GOVT. TO DECIDE VACCINATION PROBLEM

TORONTO, May 27.—With the assurance from Premier Drury that the Government would decide when compulsory vaccination was necessary and when such was to be carried out, the bill to amend the health act making the Provincial Board of Health a "body corporate" was given its third reading in the Legislature today. H. H. Dewar, Liberal leader, brought the question upon third reading, by asking if the act meant the provincial board could force compulsory vaccination on a community.

Hon. W. E. Raney assured the Liberal leader that it had nothing to do with vaccination.

URGE SPEEDY WIND UP OF LOAN COMPANY

TORONTO, May 27.—In reply to N. Amussen (North Waterloo), Hon. W. E. Raney promised that the Government would try to expedite the winding up of the Dominion Permanent Loan Company. Mr. Amussen said that there was no report and that many people could not understand the delay. K. K. Housh (South Waterloo) was of the opinion that the Government should take hold and wind up the affairs of the company quickly.

Mr. Raney pointed out that the matter was in the jurisdiction of the Dominion and not the province. He declared that the assets of the company were practically all stolen because of insufficient inspection and that they had been invested in a railway in British Columbia under disguise. The railroad seemed to be existing on paper only.

Maryborough Man and Woman Held On Charge of Murder—Inquest At Drayton On Monday—Preliminary Hearing of Accused Set For June 3.

GUELPH, May 27.—A young man named Colonel Loghrin, who resides in the Township of Maryborough, and Mrs. Nellie Beisel, from the same place, are held by the local police, both facing a charge of murder.

Loghrin was placed under arrest at his home yesterday by County Constable Green, who later brought him to Guelph. Mrs. Beisel was escorted to the city by Detective Greenaway.

Three Years Ago. It is alleged that in July, 1917, Loghrin and Mrs. Beisel, who at the time was Miss Nellie Wetzel, caused the death of a three-weeks-old child by throwing it into a well at Loghrin's farm in Maryborough Township. It is also alleged that the child was an illegitimate one, of which Loghrin was the father. The child was born in Toronto on July 11, 1917, and between

Hon. Manning Doherty Outlines Immigration Policy.

Manning Doherty's immigration policy, as outlined in the Legislature today, advocates that immigrants entering Canada should be hand-picked before they start out for this country, not when they arrive. These were his views this morning, when an item of \$165,000 in the estimates for colonization and immigration was being considered.

POLICE OFFICER MUST FACE MURDER TRIAL

Sergt. Burchell Allowed Freedom on Two \$10,000 Bonds.

WINDSOR, May 27.—Although the coroner's jury empaneled to inquire into circumstances surrounding the

death of Walter C. LaForest, who was shot by Sergt. Albert Burchell of the Walkerville police department recently, exonerated the officer from all blame in connection with the slaying, at his preliminary hearing before Magistrate Miers in Walkerville police court today Sergt. Burchell was committed for trial on two sureties of \$10,000 at the fall assizes at Sandwich. No objection was offered by the defence to the commitment.

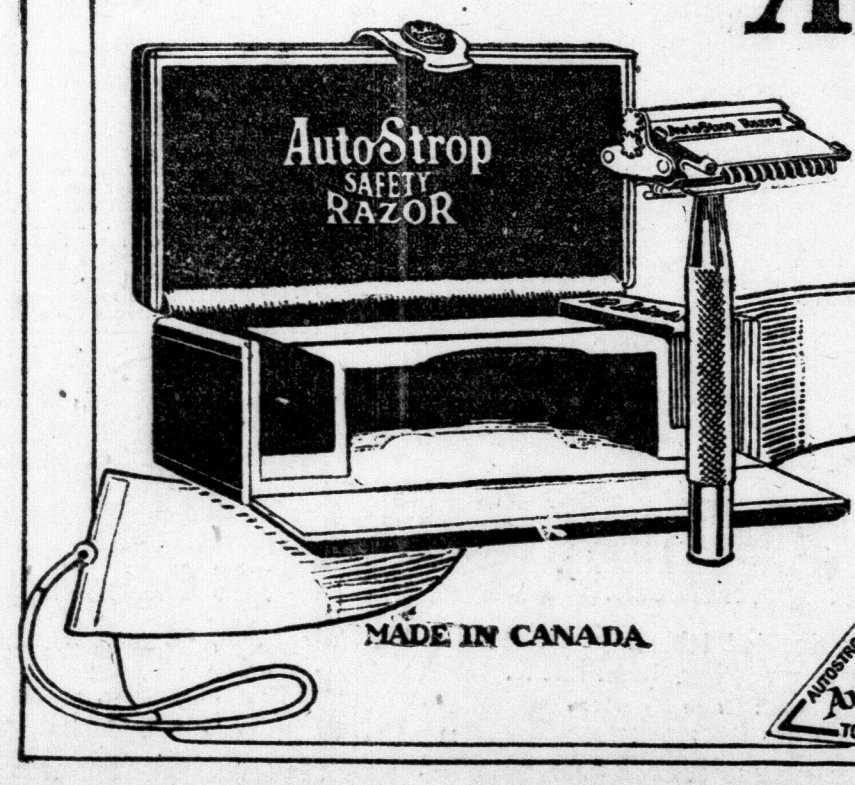
