Graduate Nurses.

At the annual meeting of the Graduate Nurses' Association of Ontario, delegates were present from all parts of the province.

Miss Brent, the president, in her address, pointed out that the society, after four years, has grown in membership from 33 to 283, with 25 Canadian hospitals, 16 American and 2 old country hospitals represented.

"Our society," said Miss Brent, "was originally started for the purpose of advancing the interests of the profession along all lines and uniting for the purpose of presenting to the legislature a bill for registration, which seemed a great need."

"You all have heard of our lack of success, which was due, not to lack of effort, but to the fact that the public and the profession at large had not been sufficiently educated up to the point. We have not given up hope, however, that we will yet be able to accomplish our aim, but we will unite our forces and against those who oppose our progress in this special line and thus show that our ideal is not our own agrarianism, but the elevation of our grand profession to the highest rank."

"This year our efforts have been towards the incorporation of the society, which we are happy to say is an accomplished fact. Our only object is to further the interest of the nurses in every possible way."

"My suggestion would be that literature dealing with the subject of registration be sent to all graduates in Ontario, and that a small committee, with an energetic governor, should be formed to communicate with superintendents of schools and presidents of alumnae associations, asking them to bring this subject to the attention of the graduates. We had hoped to be able this year to send to all the different cities representatives to speak about the importance of this work, but owing to the small membership our finances would not allow of it."

THOUGHT IT WAS WAR.
Argentine Warship Scars Residents Near Montevideo.

RIO DE JANEIRO, April 19.—A despatch received here says that an Argentine warship during manoeuvres last night near Montevideo, fired 200 shots from heavy guns and threw their searchlights for a considerable time in all directions over the shores. This resulted in almost a panic among the inhabitants who were for a time unable to understand the nature of the seeming demonstration.

Recently there has been some friction between Uruguay and the Argentine Republic on the question of which country had jurisdiction of the water of the Plata River. A number of Argentine warships at different times entered the harbor of Montevideo without firing the accustomed salute. The prime minister of the Argentine Republic in a recent speech declared that all the waters of the River Plate belonged to the Argentine Republic.

It was known that Sir Henry Clinton, the British commander, succeeded in reaching Sandy Hook after the battle.
