At the last meeting of the council, the commissioner succeeded in having a resolution rushed thru authorizing the purchase of the 2½ acres of land at the edge of the hill in the vicinity of Tyrrel avenue, from the Turner estate at a cost of \$75,000 to \$100,000. Residents declared to the board yesterday that this was all highly restricted property, and if opened up as a park the value of their properties would be depreciated.
