# BASEBALL LEAGUES WORK FOR HARMONY

National, American and  
Minors Appoint Committee  
to Draft Agreement.

Chicago, Feb. 12.—Major and minor league officials met today and after several hours of conference adjourned. It was decided that a committee of three from the National League and a committee of three from the American League should meet with a committee of three from the minor league leagues and draw up a working agreement among the leagues.

Selection of the chairman of the National Baseball Commission to succeed August W. Herrmann of Cincinnati is expected today. President John Heydler of the National League and B. B. Johnson of the American League, and attention of the various league representatives here turned to efforts to effect a resumption of relations between major and minor organizations. Virtually all other business of the five leagues—National, American, Three-Base, Western and American Association—which hold annual meetings here, was completed yesterday.

Five men from whom a new national commission chairman might be chosen were recommended to a joint committee of both leagues by a nominating committee, and their names were passed on to the two league executives.

They were: Federal Judge Kenneth Mountain of St. Louis; Harry T. Woodruff, sporting editor of The Chicago Tribune; and William Edwards, J. Conway Toole, and State Senator J. B. Walker, the last three of New York.

Herrmann announced he favored Woodruff, saying a newspaper man was especially acceptable. A high baseball official said selection of Judge Mountain was improbable.


