Dockstader's Minstrels-Princess.

One innovation noticeable at the Princess last night was the curtain. Of drab hue, it lacked the usual art study and instead had emblazoned upon it in large crimson letters the reassuring statement "Asbestos." The lobby has been nicely decorated, and the whole house, of course, thoroly renovated. So with a bumper audience and Dockstader's minstrels to provide the entertainment there is no reason at all why Manager Sheppard shouldn't feel that a most successful season was auspiciously begun. There is only one minstrel show that is worth while, they say, and that's the, one Dockstader and his merry men constitute.
