



TEN MILLION OYSTER SHELLS.

Oyster shells have of late become quite valuable. It has been discovered that they are excellent to build roads with; they are also used for fertilizers and- the manufacture of buttons. Nowadays the oysterman saves his shells and sells them at a profit. The biggest pile of shells in the world is situated at Hampton, Va., on Chesapeake bay, the greatest of oyster waters. This miniature mountain is the product of one season's catch of one man, Frank Darling, the millionaire "King of the Oystermen." The pile is 50 feet high and 150 feet long, and contains about 200,000 bushels of shells, which yielded about 5,000,000 oysters. These shells will sell for \$10,000, and before the next season the pile will have disappeared, to make room for another as large. 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




