These men have met twice before, once

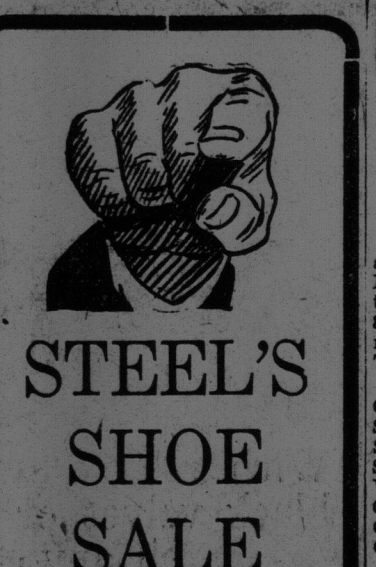
in Houlton and once in Bangor; as the

GERMANS SHOW DISREGARD FOR WASTE OF LIFE

Ranks Reformed and Advanced
After Being Shattered by Mail
of Lead — Mowed Down Like
Grass

North of France, May 29.—Such in-
credibly tenacity and disregard of waste
of life are being displayed by the Ger-
mans in their furious attacks northeast
of Ypres that the execution done by the
British artillery fire upon La Bassee and
the German second line near that place,
and the progress made by the French
north of Arras toward Vlisay, become of
merely subordinate interest.

A terrific bombardment was opened in
the course of the night. It proved a
continuous hail of shells, that showed
clearly that the Germans intended to
advance at all costs by sheer weight of
metal and men. Under this appalling
avalanche of steel and high explosive,
the British bore themselves wonderfully,
though suffering heavy losses. They
steadily awaited the onrushes that were
to follow. Then their opportunity
came.

Suddenly in the moonlight the Ger-
mans swarmed up one of their trenches
and began to form for the advance. The
British artillery and machine guns, as-
sisted by the French artillery, let loose
a tornado of lead among them, mowing
them down like grass; but with absolute
disregard of the slaughter, the German
troops continued to reform themselves
into massed columns and then started to
advance in their old style formation. Six
times in succession their columns swung
forward to utter annihilation. All this
colossal sacrifice of life yielded them no-
thing except a few ruined farms.

Meanwhile to prevent the French and
Belgians on the British left from ad-
vancing and causing a diversion, the Ger-
mans turned upon their lines about
Stenestrate the same artillery fire of
