NEW SCHEME TO WIPE OUT N.Y. SLUMS GIVEN

Plan Calls for Expenditure of \$100,000,000 a Year

HALF TO BE DONATED BY WEALTHY PEOPLE

New Apartment Houses Would Be Rented for What Tenants Could Pay

NEW YORK, Oct. 15.—A concrete plan for ridding the city of all its "old law" tenements has been advanced by August Heckscher.

The plan calls for the contribution of \$50,000,000 a year for five years by 500 wealthy citizens for appropriation of the same sum by the city and state, and the passage of drastic laws patterned after those by which England is wiping out the London slums.

EUROPE LATELY VISITED.

Mr. Heckscher recently visited Europe as "special emissary" of New York City, appointed by Mayor Walker to study the methods used abroad to provide proper housing in congested sections of cities. As the result of his studies, he said in a preliminary report, that he is convinced New York's slums can be wiped out, and the old, insanitary tenements replaced by modern apartment buildings.

RENT BASED ON PURSES.

In one respect Mr. Heckscher's plan differs from those of other persons who have experimented with model tenements. The model buildings, he said, should not be rented for a fixed price per room. Instead, he believes, "the only intelligent way" is to charge families whatever rent they can afford. "I am told this is socialism," he said. "Every forward-looking scheme has been thus labeled and damned. I am not interested in political labels. I am thinking of results."

While his preliminary report did not go into details concerning the legislation necessary for elimination of the slums, he suggested that the state, by exercising its right of eminent domain, can take over any land needed for the new tenements.

N. Y. PLANS APPROVED

PITTSBURGH, Pa., Oct. 24.—Plans of public spirited citizens and officials of New York City to eliminate the notorious slums of the East Side, have found favor with Mrs. Knott Haux, director of the Department of Welfare of Pittsburgh, and one of the leading social workers here.

Every big city in the United States should look with favor upon the New York plan to replace slums and tenements with well-ventilated, sun-lit, and airy apartments, said Mrs. Haux, a well known philanthropist.

"This transformation in our cities can be made only with the aid of public spirited citizens and officials. The sympathetic citizens and those who have the welfare of our cities at heart, need only to have the generous impulses encouraged, and behold, we would be in a position to eliminate the slums and the tenements, and give many of our working people healthy living quarters at nominal cost."

NEGRO SAVES MAN CAUGHT IN SHIFTING SAND

Himself Imprisoned, Refuses Rescue Until Companion Is Safe

NEW YORK, Oct. 15.—By scooping away sand from the face of William Reinet for half an hour, Benjamin Langford, a negro laborer, saved his fellow-workman, who is white, from being smothered to death in a shifting 100-foot sand pile at West Nineteenth street and Coney Island Creek, Brooklyn. Langford himself was buried to the waist, and both were eventually rescued by Fire Rescue Squad No. 2 with a block and tackle.

Reinet, who is 31 years old, had slipped from the crest of the pile and rolled into an artificial pit formed by the sand and an adjoining mound of crushed stone. No sooner had he come to rest at the bottom than the sand started to shift. Before he could regain his feet and struggle out of the amphitheatre he was buried to the neck.

Seeing the plight of his companion, Langford scrambled to his aid. The sand kept pouring in from above, and Langford had to work like mad to keep Reinet from going under. Meanwhile he shouted "police," "help," "fire" and everything else calculated to arouse the attention of persons in the neighborhood.

But the deluge only increased in velocity, and Langford was growing hopeless when a policeman in the street heard the calls.

Battalion Chief Michael Shanahan was summoned with Fire Rescue Squad No. 2. When the Chief peered into the area, he saw the negro, a puffing automaton, frantically brushing sand from Reinet's head. A temporary scaffolding was rigged up and a rope lowered. Langford was told to "grab the rope," but he refused and fastened it under Reinet's arms. When Reinet had been drawn to safety the negro allowed himself to be hoisted from the pit.

Both men were exhausted. They were revived with a stimulant and allowed a day off by their employers, the M. J. O'Hara Contracting Company.

Letters To The Editor

Food Controller Suggested

To the Editor of The Times-Star:—Sir, I am enclosing a clipping from a recent English newspaper, which should furnish grounds for investigation by the Citizens' Committee, as to why a food product that is grown in Canada and imported into England, can be purchased there at a much lesser price than in Saint John.

According to the clipping, a sack of flour containing 280 pounds can be bought in England for 47 shillings, equivalent to \$112.50 Canadian currency. Following the same ratio, a barrel of flour containing 196 lbs., should only cost \$7.85 at Saint John. The difference in bread is much greater. A quarter loaf—4 lbs.—costs 2-1/2 pence in England—10 cents, or 4-5-4 cents per pound. Using the same ratio a 11-2 lb loaf should cost 7-1-8 cents, whilst the nearest flour in Saint John is charged double that price. All of which tends to prove that a food controller for Saint John would save the consumers many thousands of dollars, and only add one extra official to the many food controllers that we are encumbered with.

The clipping sent by Mr. McMenamin reads as follows:

"Tomorrow the price of bread in London will be reduced by one halfpenny to 9-1/2d. per quarter loaf. This decision was reached at a joint meeting of the London Master Bakers' Protection Society and the principal wholesale society. A reduction in the price of flour to 47s. per sack in the home market, and a decrease to a shilling less in the London district, was announced a week ago. When the price of flour is below 50s. and above 40s. according to the ruling of the Food Council, bread should be 9-1/2d."
