MANY BOYS IN TRAINING FOR RING HONORS

Louis Donovan Handling Big Class In Y. M. C. I. Gymnasium

The date for the holding of the New Brunswick Amateur Boxing Championships has been fixed for April 12, when it is expected a large field will compete for the various titles that will be at stake. Much interest has been aroused in local boxing circles over the coming meet and several of the mitt artists are hard at work conditioning themselves for the tournament, and as a result competition is expected to be keen.

The meet is being held under the auspices of the St. Peter's Y. M. A. and will be staged in the association's gymnasium on Elm street. Louis Donovan, former Maritime 126-pound amateur champion has been retained to get the competitors into shape for the coming bouts and will have a class of about twenty boys training faithfully for the big meet on the floors of the Y. M. C. I. gymnasium. It is said there is a considerable amount of talent being displayed by the youthful aspirants for ring honors and it is expected that when the going sounds for the first bout next month a series of fast and clever exhibitions will result.

THOSE IN TRAINING

Among those in the 100 pound class working out for the tournament are John Lifford, D. Connolly, said to be related to the famous "Fiddie," and "Young" Connolly. Working out for 108 pound class honors is Gerald Donovan, brother of Louis, and said to possess much of the latter's skill. Among the 112 pounders are Benjie Goldworthy, Jimmy Gibeau, Jimmy McKillop, Jack Landers and Bobby Paine. The 118-pound class should furnish good competition as Pat Whipple, present Maritime champion, Harvey Lunney, runner-up in the Nova Scotia championships last year, Stan. Lochery, Geo. Moore and Jim Sands, former N. B. champion, will come together in this class. In the 126 pound bouts will be seen Dave McNulty, said to be one of the most promising featherweights seen in the Maritime Provinces in some years. The 135 pound events also ought to furnish good entertainment as several good boys will contest in this class, including Tommy Kehler, former 118 pound Maritime champion, and Joe Veno, former Maritime 116 pound champion. It is probable that Reg. Harper, the clever colored boxer, will participate in this class also. The 147 pound events will bring together Arthur Murphy, Eddie Hunt and William Dalling, all good men.

Kid Kaplan Must Box Canadian Champion

NEW YORK, March 22.—Louis (Kid) Kaplan, Meriden boxer, who holds the world's featherweight title, is the latest of the prominent boxers on the State's list of licensed operatives to find himself in difficulty. At the State Athletic Commission's meeting recently, Chairman James Farley instructed Secretary Bert Stand to order Scotty Monteth, part-manager of Kaplan, before the board to explain why Kaplan has not fulfilled a contract of box Leo (Kid) Roy in Montreal, or to advance legitimate reasons for his failure to do so. This action followed a protest from the Montreal Boxing Commission that Kaplan had signed for the fight on last Nov. 9, but had failed to discharge this contract. Chairman Farley deferred action by the local board until Monteth appears to explain the situation from the champion's side. It is expected that Monteth will present himself for question at the commission's meeting on Tuesday.

ACADIA DROPS OUT OF COLLEGE LEAGUE

Have Withdrawn From Western Intercollegiate Athletics—Action Causes Surprise

FREDERICTON, March 22.—The U. N. B. Athletic Association received word over the week-end that Acadia University was dropping out of the Western Section Intercollegiate Maritime Athletics. The news was a distinct surprise to the U. N. B. men who have been competing with Acadia for many years. The Western Section is at present composed of Mount Allison, Acadia and U. N. B., three colleges who have been competing ever since the beginning of intercollegiate sport in the province.

HOME AND HOME GAMES

If Acadia's withdrawal is to mean that there will be only the two New Brunswick colleges in the Western Section, home and home games will be played, according to a statement of the U. N. B. faculty representative on the athletic association. This will mean less expense than the long trips to Wolfville involved and will establish a fairer test of the teams.

Officers of the local association did not care to make any statement regarding annual barnstorming tours, or competition with the upper provinces teams being made possible by this action of Acadia University.



Will Come East To Play Winners of National Hockey League

VANCOUVER, B. C., March 23.—For the second season in succession Victoria Cougars won the Western Canada Hockey League title, and will come east to play the winners of the National Hockey League. Last night they held the Edmonton Eskimos to a 2 to 2 tie, winning the round by the score of 5 to 3. Edmonton stepped onto the ice last night, and made a desperate attempt to overcome the two goal handicap, Sheppard and Gagne scored before ten minutes of the period elapsed and tied the series score. Victoria, which had played a defensive game up to that point, started an offensive and in 47 seconds Frederickson had scored what proved to be the winning goal. There was no score in the second period, but in the third Fayot added another tally for Victoria.

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
