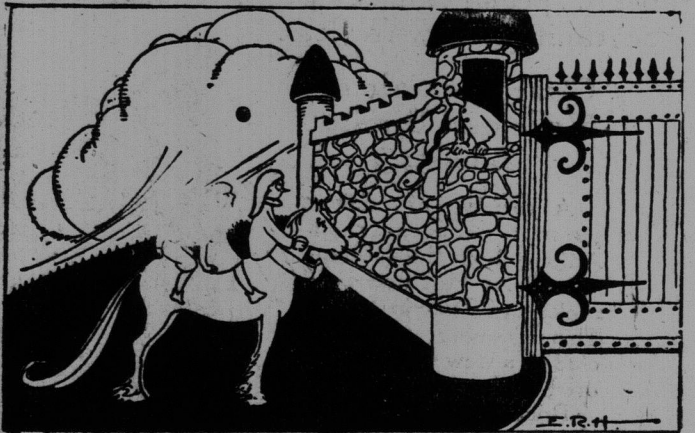

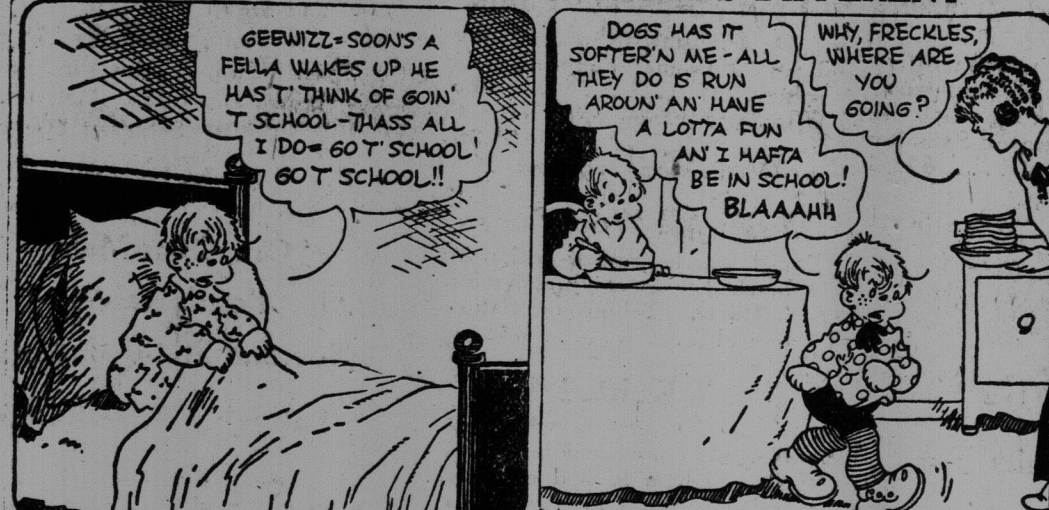

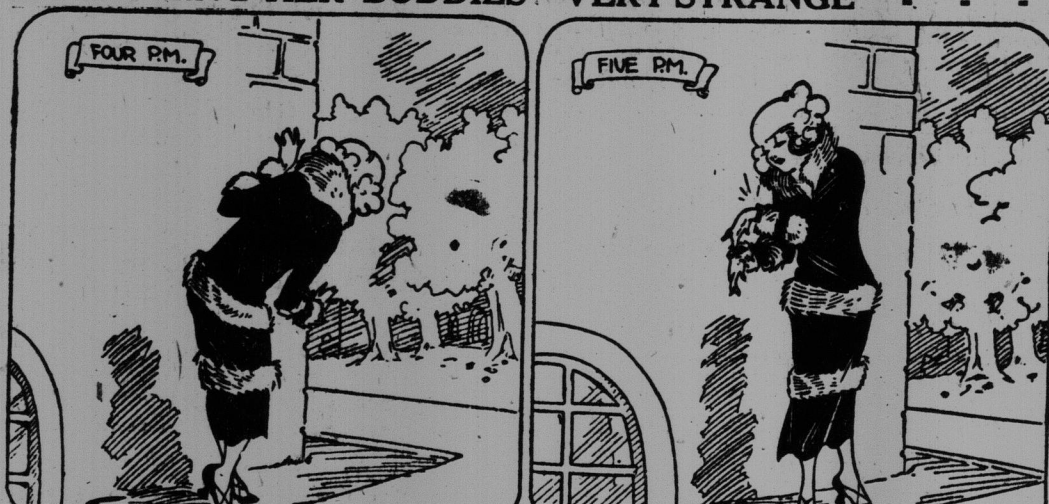

The meeting expressed appreciation of the appointment of a Maritime boys' work secretary and of the selection of Mr. Machum to fill that position.
