## ROBBERS FEIGNS ILLNESS.

Lies in Road and With Assistants Holds Up Passing Doctor.

Cornwall, N. Y., July 23.—Daring highway robbers inaugurated a new system of "getting the money" on the State Road near here when they relieved Dr. W. F. Fogle of Cornwall of \$145 in cash but overlooked \$1,000 worth of diamond rings.

Dr. Fogle was driving along when he observed a man lying in the centre of the road, face downward. Thinking he was an accident victim, Dr. Fogle stopped, and as he bent over to turn the man on his back to examine him, a voice from the darkness shouted "hands up."

With Dr. Fogle covered with a gun, the man on the ground jumped up and went through his clothing, taking all of his money. The robbers then locked his car, took the keys and forced the doctor to walk down the road a half mile, while they escaped in the darkness.

**INFLUX OF AMERICANS FOR STUDIES IN MEXICO**

Mexico City, July 24.—There is a remarkable increase this year in the number of students from the United States who are taking advantage of the annual summer course offered them by the National University of Mexico City. In the first year of these classes the attendance of Americans was seventy-two, but by 1922 the number had increased to 482, while for the present course it is expected that the number will exceed 5,000.

The classes, which will terminate about the end of August, will be held each morning, in order that the students may be free during the afternoon to visit Mexico's museums.

The studies will include Spanish literature, Latin-American history and geography, music and kindred arts, both Mexican and Spanish, Mexican archaeology, customs and political problems.

**LAND 1,400-LB. TUNA FISH.**

Giant, Fourteen Feet Long, Battles Its Captors Two Hours.

Manassas, N. J., July 23.—Employees of the Manassas Fish Company landed a 1,400-pound tuna, fourteen feet long, here recently. It is the largest ever caught in these waters.
