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### VETERANS' FAIR IS BROUGHT TO END

Record Crowd Attends and Prize Winners are Announced.

The largest attendance during its entire course marked the close of the Great War Veterans' fair on Saturday evening. The visitors numbered in all over 1,000 during the course of the evening and they generally patronized the various attractions. The several games were keenly contested, all reaching the play-off stage as two or more competitors had made exceptionally high or perfect scores.

The police popularity voting contest proved the most attractive feature of the evening, closely followed by the ever-popular house-house game. A most successful sale of home cooking was conducted by the members of the Loyalist chapter of the I. O. O. F. The drawing for door prizes aroused great interest.

The evening's prizes were won by tickets, numbers 648 and number 626, whose holders are entitled to a three-months' pass to the Queen square theatre and one dozen photographs at the Erb studio, respectively. The grand prize for the whole period of the fair, which is \$25, awaits the holder of ticket number 8098. The other prize winners on Saturday evening were as follows: Bowling alley, ladies, Miss Edna Driscoll, a pair of mahogany candlesticks; gentlemen's, W. Riley and J. McGilfrid and agreed to roll off this evening on the G. W. V. A. alleys to decide the winner of the silver-mounted shaving set which was the prize; devil-among-the-tailors, ladies only, Mrs. Darling, half dozen phonograph records; bean boards, ladies, first, Mrs. Monahan; second, Mrs. Donner; gentlemen's, first, A. The drawing for the embroidered centre piece, which was conducted at the home cooking booth was won by ticket number 11. The cake featured in the guessing contest will be officially weighed today and the winner will be announced tomorrow.

The committee in charge of the fair reports that the returns have been eminently satisfactory and the full measure of generous support given by the public has been equally gratifying. It is the hope of the committee to be able to present a final statement of the returns before the end of the week and a strong effort will be made to have all returns on hand for the meeting of the entire committee on Thursday evening. Lieut.-Colonel W. H. Harrison is the general chairman and he was assisted in conducting the fair by various sub-committees under the general direction of the vice-chairmen, W. J. Ryan and R. Wallis.

### THREE WOMEN TRY SUICIDE IN DAY

Only One, Who Leaps Six Stories, Succeeds—Others in Hospitals.

New York, Nov. 5.—One woman is dead and two others are recovering in hospitals as the result of attempts at suicide within 24 hours. The ill health of one, a heated argument with a landlord by the second and the discouragements of bread winning of the third, were ascribed as causes for their acts.

Mrs. Anna Vernachio, 55 years old, of 2887 Amsterdam avenue, prepared lunch for her husband on Wednesday, and when she had finished, jumped six stories from the roof of her home to the paved back yard. She was dead when doctors reached her. Her husband, an employee of the Street Cleaning Department, said he knew of no reason for the act; that his wife had a violent quarrel during the morning with the landlord over a clogged drain-pipe in the bathroom.

Mrs. Becky Lewis, 35 years old, of 108 East Ninety-seventh street, attempted to take her life by strangling herself with a rope attached to the chandelier in the bedroom. A neighbor found her. She revived at Harlem Hospital and will recover. Her health was assigned as the cause.

Misfortunes in a steady stream, including her inability to find work to support her blind husband and their two children prompted Mrs. Cecelia Tankin, 45 years old, of 609 East Thirtieth street, to jump into the East River from the ferryboat Joseph O'Donohue. Members of the crew rescued her. Her husband has been blind two years; one of her children is seriously ill, and she lost her position two weeks ago. She is recovering at Bellevue.

### GREEK PARTY IS AGAINST SCHEME

Athens, Nov. 4.—The Venizelist party has decided against the suggested change in the constitution, according to a semi-official statement, which says that the party after discussion rejected "a proposal for the immediate amendment of the constitution by military force and for taking a plebiscite before the election."

The party holds that the only course that can be adopted is to discuss the subject at the next National Assembly, which can decide whether to take a referendum respecting the best form of Government for Greece.

### SAYS OUTLOOK IN THE CLYDE SHIP YARDS NOT GOOD

London, Nov. 5.—The depressed state of shipbuilding on the Clyde was referred to at the Glasgow Valuation Court on Saturday, when many large industrial firms sought a reduction of their assessments.

Sir Frederick Henderson, chairman of Messrs. D. and W. Henderson, shipbuilders, Partick, said that the Clyde had never been so black as it was at present. It was unlikely that anything equal to the full capacity of the yards would be occupied for many years to come. Only one-third of the berthage was occupied. The present position was unique and was largely due to the surplus of tonnage and the modification of the Admiralty ship programme. Foreign competition in ship repair work was also responsible for the stagnation.

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### LOTS OF MONEY Required To Be Successful Lord Mayor of London

London.—Beginning Nov. 1 and continuing for one year, Sir Louis A. Newton will every month dig down into his jeans, draw forth a bunch of kale and proceed to spend it with a lavish hand. Which, translated into Londonese, means that the aldermen of the city of London have just elected him lord mayor.

On Nov. 9 alone he will spend about \$15,000 to give himself a nice lord mayor's pageant down Fleet street to the law courts and back, and to spread a rich feast for some 700 invited guests, including some of the greatest in the land. All this to celebrate his formal induction into office.

The after the calls upon his purse will be endless. Which is why the lord mayor is always a rich man.

To the uninitiated it must be explained that the gigantic metropolis is divided into various boroughs, each of which has its own government. Thus

there is a mayor of Holborn, of Westminster, of Shoreditch, etc.

But the most important of all the London boroughs is the City of London. When you say City here you always mean the square mile of territory which comprises the oldest and most important part of the metropolis, and includes the great banks and financial institutions and many of the famous buildings. It alone has a lord mayor. The others are a mere garden variety of mayors.

Here is how a lord mayor is made. The people vote for aldermen who have a life job. From their own body in rotation in order of seniority they choose a lord mayor each year. Thus each alderman, if he lives long enough, is sure to be lord mayor some day.

The City is generous enough with its chief executive. He presides over the councilmen and aldermen and acts as a police magistrate. For this he gets £10,000, or about \$50,000, a year. He is also given Mansion House, all furnished, as his official residence.

But all this is a mere drop in the bucket. Out of his own pocket the lord mayor usually spends \$100,000, or more. One recent lord mayor spent \$300,000.

To begin with, he must give four great banquets which are fixed events. One of these is his own banquet on the day he is sworn into office. Then there is a banquet for the bishops and church dignitaries, another for the judges, and another for the bankers, at which the chancellor of the exchequer usually makes one of the most important speeches of the year.

If for any reason the king of England wants to come down into the City he has to get formal permission from the lord mayor. Such visits are usually made in state and often there is a generous banquet, all of which eats up the lord mayor's money.

Finally the lord mayor is supposed to head all big charities. For instance, when the Japanese earthquake news reached London the present lord mayor or at once called upon the citizens to contribute to a relief fund. And, of course, the lord mayor led the list with a substantial donation.

Davis, former Ambassador to the Court of St. James; Secretary James J. Davis, of the United States Department of Labor; Sir Henry Thornton, president of the C. N. R.; and R. A. C. S. Smith, head of a delegation of the citizens' committee of New York.

### HALIFAX "LOVER" ATTEMPTS SUICIDE

Halifax, Nov. 4.—Sobbing out the name of the girl whose unresponsive love caused him to attempt to take his own life, George Smith, twenty-two years of age, of 2 Uniaske street, was found dangerously wounded in a Göttingen street restaurant late on Saturday night by other patrons who rushed to him when they were startled by the sound of a self-directed bullet.

The wound was in the chest just above the heart and Smith was in a critical condition at the hospital to-night.

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
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### MILITARY MEN RECEIVE APPEAL
