C. P. R. EARNINGS AGAIN CLIMBING

494 as Compared With \$12,331,370 Last Year.

Montreal, May 29.—After showing a falling off in February and March, the net earnings of the C. P. R. for April, as shown in a statement issued by the company yesterday, are again in the upgrade.

(Canadian Press Despatch.)

Ottawa, May 28.—The Canadian Pacific Railway was paid \$3,749,288 for mails service during the calendar year 1922, according to information given in the House to-day by Hon. George P. Graham, Minister of Railways and Canals, to M. N. Campbell; Progressive, Nelson. Government lines in the same period received \$3,256,594.

For the last fiscal year the expenditure on railways for mail carriage would be approximately \$7,453,000, it was stated, of which \$3,671,000 went to the Canadian Pacific and \$3,187,000 to the lines included in the Canadian National system. The policy of the Government, it was stated, is to grant mail contracts to the Canadian National Railways whenever possible.
