MORE ARRESTS ARE MADE IN INDIA

Calcutta, Dec. 12.—C. R. Das, president elect of the Indian national congress was arrested on Saturday, charged with being the manager of an unlawful association. Others arrested on Saturday included the president of the Bengal Khilafat Committee.

An official communication asserts that the "non-co-operators" are deliberately challenging the government's prescription of the so-called volunteers and says there is no alternative but to enforce the law and to prosecute the most prominent of the non-co-operators who are responsible for the situation.
