Mr. Root's proposals against the use of submarines as commerce raiders and against the employment of poison gas in warfare have been accepted by the conference bút not by a section of public opinion which seems determined to fear the worst. In the case of the submarine it is urged that a nation hard beset in war will make its own definition of merchantmen and let loose its undersea boats against merchant ships after the German fashion. A nation similarly situated will mobilize its chlorine and mustard cylinders, of which it can lay in a goodly stock in peace times, since there is no way of differentiating industrial chemistry from war chemistry.
