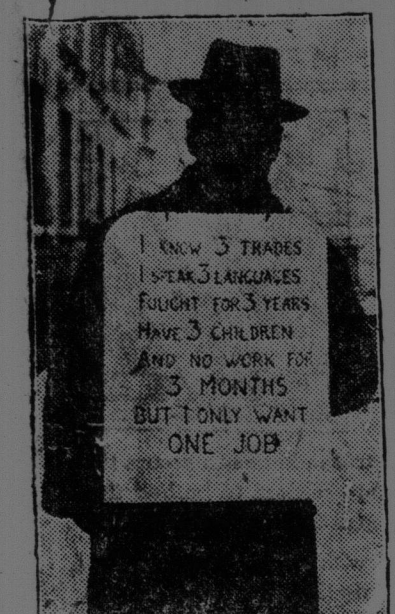

AS MANY TECHNICAL AS HIGH SCHOOLS

Canada's Need, Says Professor Gill—A Year's Record

New Brunswick Used Only \$4,561 Out of \$39,897 Available—Out of 60,546 Students in Canada 51,827 are in Evening Classes—Striking Facts.

(Special to The Times) St. John, N. B., March 22.—"If Canada is to be in the commercial race, technical school accommodation must be increased within the next at least to equality with the technical school accommodation," says the director of technical education, a report to the department of technical education act. The statement covers all operations to the end of the year, June 30, and says that the department was given to work in the provinces by the act and that next few years should witness a decided development.

"The increased cost of building and of equipment will not doubt adversely affect the development, as it will present an insuperable difficulty to some of the smaller towns and cities," says the report. "As an illustration, it may be pointed out that for a city with a population of 50,000 the cost of building and equipping a technical school to meet even the present needs will exceed \$200,000. Yet the total amount available from the federal grant last year for the largest of the Western Provinces was only \$61,888. To assist in overcoming this difficulty it may be necessary for the federal government to aid the provinces on the more liberal scale recommended by the royal commission."

The report also deals with the difficulty of securing properly qualified teachers. Institutions which are equipped to train teachers for ordinary educational work are of no use for this purpose. An institution equipped and staffed for this purpose is needed. Professor Gill says that Ontario and Quebec are financially able to establish such an institution but that the cost would be too onerous for other provinces. Therefore he recommends a federal institution for the whole of Canada established through the cooperation of all the provinces.

Of the \$700,000 available for distribution to the provinces under the technical education act only \$278,757.99 was utilized. Ontario used \$111,751 out of a possible \$224,383, Quebec \$94,716 out of a possible \$180,109, New Brunswick \$4,561 out of \$39,897, Nova Scotia \$14,079 out of \$17,868, and so on for the other provinces. There are 139 vocational schools in Canada, twelve day, nine-eight evening, and twenty-three day and evening. There are 1510 teachers including 864 day, 1,423 evening and three correspondence. The New Brunswick vocational board in the course of an exhaustive and revealing report of development in its province especially speaks enthusiastically of the benefit of evening schools, stating its belief that "an evening school should be established in every community in New Brunswick." It also recommends that localities should be reimbursed for outlay on capital account for vocational education, using 25 per cent. of Dominion grant for that purpose. It suggests that soldiers' civil re-establishment department equipment should be made available for educational purposes on favorable terms, and that increased aid should be given on the salaries of vocational teachers out of Dominion grants available.

THE HOSPITAL

Several Resolutions Passed Last Night by Board—Increased Insurance—More Comfort for Patients.

An adjourned meeting of the commissioners of the General Public Hospital was held last evening, with Mr. E. Asper in the chair. A letter from Dr. W. W. Smith, president of the board, was read. The absence of Dr. G. A. B. Addy and Dr. A. L. Davidson, Dr. Davidson being appointed his representative, was noted. A resolution was passed that the commissioners deemed it inadvisable to make any change in the rules and that the work should be taken up by the other members of the staff.

The report of the insurance committee was received and adopted. It showed that \$98,000 additional insurance had been placed on the new nurses' home, bringing the total amount of insurance up to \$125,000.

A bill for \$801, for use of a room by one of the early graduates of the hospital who had been ill and died, was ordered remitted as it was the custom to extend the courtesy of the hospital to graduates. A letter from the Colwell Fuel Company, asking for a share of the coal business of the institution, was received and the coal question discussed. As this company has never been given any business and as the coal offered them when analyzed showed high quality the superintendent had ordered 100 tons. He was authorized to order an additional 100 tons and it is probable that further supplies will be purchased by tender. While the coal discussion was on it was shown that it cost the local institution \$17,000 for fuel last year, while the Victoria General Hospital, Halifax, about the same size as the St. John hospital, spent \$27,000 for the same purpose. The local hospital burns about three tons a day in the summer and from seven to ten tons in the winter.

Recommendations. A comprehensive report was received from J. King Kelley, the visiting consultant for February. He made several recommendations for improvements. The first section made recommendations as to certain changes in compiling statistics in regard to chronic and acute cases. The section was adopted after a lengthy discussion. It was decided to adopt the recommendation that patients be furnished writing materials and some one detailed to write letters for those unable to do so. The head



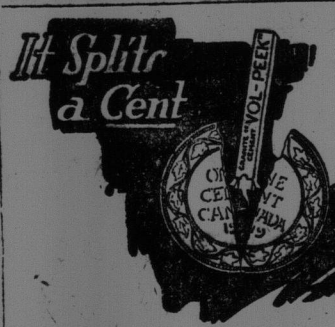

nurse was made responsible that this is some of this but it was pointed out that some of the patients would be confined to nurses and those in authority in certain matters. The recommendation that visitors be excluded from the children's ward raised a vigorous discussion. Mrs. McLellan and others taking strenuous exception to the exclusion of mothers from their children. Mr. Kelley had retarded the recovery of the child of contagion. In all the best regulated hospitals, he said, such a rule was in effect. It was finally decided that this section be laid on the table until the report of the visiting committee, which will be made next month, is received. The recommendation that printed forms be furnished to patients for the making of complaints was adopted. It was thought that this would have the effect of improving the service. The recommendation that a suction fan to gather fumes of cooking food and other odors from the kitchen be installed, was referred to the house committee to report back. The recommendation that local fire extinguishers be installed without delay in the nurses' home was referred to the house committee with power to act. The noise of faulty radiators was also referred to the house committee with power to act. A recommendation that a campaign be instituted to do away with unnecessary noise in the hospital was adopted.

Mrs. McLellan drew attention to the fact that Dr. Abramson was using the food refrigerator for the storing of serums and cultures. It was shown that there was no danger of infection from this source. The matter was discussed at some length and consideration was given to the construction of a separate refrigerator for the laboratory but no action was taken.

IN PARLIAMENT

Sharp Debate On Resolution For Grant to Help All Thrifty Own Homes.

Ottawa, March 22.—(Canadian Press.) Today, in the House of Commons, the premier announced that a slackening of immigration restrictions was not being considered by the cabinet. First reading was given a bill amending the dominion elections act. Sharp debate on a resolution moved by H. C. Hocken of Toronto West, to appropriate \$10,000,000 annually for five years in order to enable "every industrious, thrifty and thrifty citizen to become the owner, in fee simple, of a house and lot." There was a divergence of opinion. No action was taken, and the debate was adjourned.

When the House resumed in the evening, Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux moved his resolution to permit cabinet ministers to sit in both houses.

Re: Hon. Arthur Meighen said he foresaw constitutional difficulties. The question should be thoroughly discussed in both houses of parliament and in the press. The resolution was finally withdrawn by its mover.

Replies to Questions. Replying to a question by J. F. Johnston (Unionist, Lost Mountain), R. Light

Hon. Arthur Meighen said the government did not contemplate legislation amending the present immigration laws with a view to improving conditions on the government railways.

Re: (Weston-McGowan-Madawaska), was told by the prime minister that it was not the practice for commissions on the tariff to submit a report. The minister of finance would probably inform the house when the budget was brought down as to the information gathered.

Operating expenses of the Grand Trunk Railway during 1920 were fully met by current revenue, according to information brought down in the house.

Directors who compose the board of management of the Canadian National Railways were paid \$18,000 in fees, plus traveling expenses to and from their homes during 1920, according to a return tabled today.

Hon. Hugh Guthrie introduced a bill amending the statutes relating to corrupt practices at elections. He explained that the amendment had to do with technical wording. The bill was given first reading.

Further grants under the Dominion housing scheme of 1919 were advocated by W. C. MacQuarrie (New Westminster), who read a memorandum from the G. W. V. A. of this city urging such action.

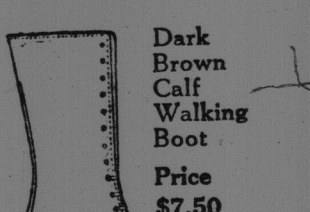
A TRAWLER'S FIND.

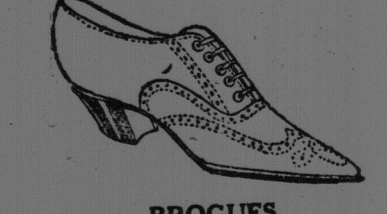

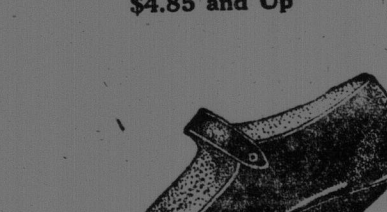
