Will Build Big Ring.

Kitchener, March 19.—The Young Business Men's Association of Kitchener has agreed to subscribe \$250,000 for the erection of a monster hockey and skating arena in this city. The structure will be equipped with an artificial ice plant of the most approved design, and will be modern in all respects.

Plans for the campaign have already taken definite shape, and this is no post-season dream. Work on the erection of the arena is expected to be commenced during the summer, so as to have the arena ready to open early in the autumn. It is proposed to install a plant capable of turning out artificial ice in large quantities for domestic purposes.

Olympic Contest.

New York, March 22.—A cable yesterday from Antwerp to the American Olympic committee announced that the American hockey team entry for the Olympic games has been accepted. The team will sail on April 7 or 10. Other contestants will be teams from Canada, Sweden, Norway and possibly Denmark.

Cambridge, Mass., March 23.—Harvard's varsity eight-oared crew is the biggest, in weight and stature, of any on record here, according to statistics just compiled. Sedgwick and Lewis McCagg are the giants of the crew, each weighing 198 pounds and standing six feet four inches tall.
