PINDER REFUSES TO PRODUCE ACCOUNTS

Contradicts The Evidence of Mr. Stewart — The Southampton Railway Case

Fredericton, N. B., Jan. 16.—In the Southampton railway case today James K. Pinder was on the stand for most of the session and in his evidence contradicted what had been said by John E. Stewart, the plaintiff, in almost every detail.

On cross-examination in the afternoon, Mr. Carvell examined Mr. Pinder's figures of bond and bank interest, getting dates and figures in an effort to show the work did not advance to any extent ahead of the bond issue and subsidies. The bond issue was divided into three payments. The first of \$50,000 in April, 1912, the second of \$50,000 in November, 1912, and the last during the fall of 1913.

Mr. Pinder said that he did not question Mr. Hazen's statement regarding the nature of the securities but that Mr. Stewart made the statement that securities had been provided; that this was discussed at the meeting and the contract let on this understanding. He learned from Hazen that no securities had been furnished early in November or late in October.

When shown copy of a letter which D. K. Hazen had testified sending Mr. Pinder, dated October 19, and which revealed that financial arrangements were still unsettled instead of being completed, as he professed to believe was the case at this time, Mr. Pinder denied ever having seen it. He also denied the authorship of a letter signed by him and addressed to D. McNicoll, general manager of C. P. R., advising that official to say nothing to J. M. Robinson, St. John, which might prejudice Mr. Robinson, as the company was looking to him to finance the road.

REPORT SHOWS BANK IN FLOURISHING CONDITION

The Bank of Nova Scotia's eighty-second annual statement appears in this issue. Owing to changes in the form of statements made necessary by the recent revision of the Bank Act, comparisons with last year's figures cannot readily be made. However, it may be noted that the total assets have increased from \$71,279,399.95 to \$80,151,829.99 during the year. Liabilities to the public (deposits, notes outstanding, etc.) total \$62,086,486.27. The holdings of coin and legal tender amount to \$10,440,546.08. Notes of and cheques on other banks amount to \$1,785,468.07, and are immediately available assets such as call loans and investments held to the extent of \$20,746,796.20. So it can be seen that against the bank's total liabilities to the public it holds in cash 16 per cent., in immediately available 29 per cent., and in quick assets 62 per cent. This is a very strong showing and should be commended with satisfaction by the shareholders and depositors.

Net profits for the year, after losses by bad debts are estimated and provided for, amount to \$1,210,774.89, as compared with \$970,544.88 a year ago. These profits are distributed in the payment of dividends at the rate of 14 per cent. to the Officers' Pension Fund \$80,000, written off Bank Premiums \$150,000, Premium paid Bank of New Brunswick \$20,000, purchase of New Brunswick Reserve Fund \$110,000, leaving a balance of \$41,124.27 to carry forward. The paid-up capital has been increased by an issue of new stock and by the capital stock of the Bank of New Brunswick from \$4,784,850 to \$6,000,000. The reserve fund with the addition of the reserve of the Bank of New Brunswick \$1,790,000, premium received on

new stock \$871,854 and an appropriation from profit and loss of \$110,000, is brought to an even \$11,000,000. The shareholders of this old institution must be pleased indeed to note that their bank has so well maintained its position during the year 1913.
