WOMEN'S WORK
FOR WARRIORS

Will Provide Comforts For The Volunteers
MEETINGS YESTERDAY

Call Issued to Members of Women's Institutes—Local and Canadian War Notes

Yesterday afternoon the advisory board of the St. John Women's Patriotic Society held a meeting and decided on certain procedure in their work. The St. John Women's Patriotic Society is an organization of which every woman belonging to the various women's organizations in St. John is a member by that very fact but as it is desired by the advisory committee an active worker.
The advisory committee itself is only a committee appointed to superintend the work undertaken by the various organizations in such way that the work will not overlap nor the workers conflict with each other and at the same time be lost. The ladies composing this committee are as follows: Lady Tilley, Mrs. James H. Friel, Mrs. T. H. Bullock, Mrs. J. V. Ellis, Mrs. James Devere, Mrs. E. A. Smith, Mrs. L. R. Harrison, Mrs. James F. Making of "Housewives."
At yesterday's meeting it was decided that the ladies of the three chapters of the Daughters of the Empire in the city would undertake the making of the "housewives" for the local men and will get to work immediately so as to have them ready by the time that the St. John boys go away. A committee of which Lady Tilley is chairwoman will undertake the procuring of 800 pairs of heavy home knit grey woolen socks. Considerable attention was paid by the committee to the outfit for a soldier's equipment and military regulations as to weight were submitted and considered. These regulations give the size, weight, etc., of the different articles and should prove a valuable guide to those who are giving this matter their special attention. A list of articles which the women might make or purchase for the use of the soldiers was submitted and will be used as a guide in procuring supplies. The Soldiers Wives' League met last evening at Lady Tilley's apartments in the Prince William hotel to discuss future plans. The Red Cross Society will meet in the same place this afternoon to effect organization.

Miss Hazel E. Winter, supervisor of the Women's Institutes in New Brunswick is issuing a call to all members to join in the work of providing comforts for the soldiers.

Wonderful Western Development of Live Stock Industry

Saskatoon, Sask., Aug. 18—As the Winnipeg stock yards are naturally the largest and most important in the west, drawing their supplies as they do at present, from almost every section of the country, the following statistics may be accepted as a fair criterion of the present extraordinary development of the live stock industry characteristic of all three prairie provinces:

Total increase, 171,281 head or 159.2 per cent.

Similar important increases are reported from other important stock marketing centres in the west, all going to illustrate that not only have our prairie farmers determined to become an important factor in the world's meat supply, but that the process of achieving this ambition is encouragingly, indeed, outstandingly profitable.

Stomach Troubles
Due to Acidity

SO SAYS EMINENT SPECIALIST
So-called stomach troubles, such as indigestion, wind, stomach-ache, and inability to retain food, are in probably nine cases out of ten simply evidence that fermentation is taking place in the food contents of the stomach causing the formation of gas and acids. Stop or prevent them by the use of a proper anti-acid, such as bisulphated magnesia, which can be obtained from any druggist and thus enable the stomach to do its work properly without being hindered by poisonous gas and dangerous acids.—M.
