## PORT NEWS OF THE DAY; HOME AND ABROAD

Sunday Bill Shelved.

It is said that the shelving of the Sunday baseball bill at Albany dispels the chance the International League had of operating next season. If the bill had been passed, it is possible that the clubs could attempt to start the season, but with this possibility gone, the league will undoubtedly disband even before the start of the meeting here at the end of the month. The organization had permission to delay the sending out of contracts from March 1 to April 1, pending the outcome of the Sunday baseball agreement.

When the International votes to disband it is likely that part of the territory now controlled by the various clubs will be taken up by new promoters, and one of the former International League clubs will combine with several cities of the Eastern League of New England, forming a new circuit. Providence, all be in the new circuit and possibly every city.

Probably No Robertson.

New York, Mar. 7.—Davy Robertson, the temperamental right fielder, is probably lost to the Giants, as no glad tidings have been received from Manager McGraw as to his interview with Robertson in Virginia last week. Friends of Robertson in this city state that the out-

fielder, who is in the department of justice, will continue his work instead of converting for the Giants at the Polo Grounds.

Will Not Sell Lajolo.  
J. J. McCaffery of Toronto says that Lajolo is not for sale, and that he will pay him his full salary for 1918, and use him for an ornament, rather than let him go to Indianapolis or any other club that is seeking the Frenchman's services.

**WRESTLING.**  
Zbyszko vs. "Strangler" Lewis.  
Jack Curley, manager of Wladek Zbyszko, wrestler, announced his willingness to match Zbyszko against Ed. "Strangler" Lewis, Kentucky grappler. Lewis manager, Billy Sandow, recently issued a deft to the wrestlers of the country on behalf of the southerners, and particularly to Zbyszko. Sandow charged that the mat exponents were dodging the issue with Lewis, and were afraid of the southerner's head lock.

Lewis and Zbyszko have been opponents in two matches locally, and each has registered a victory over the other. In their first meeting Lewis forced Zbyszko to quit with his head lock and in the second meeting, when the southerner's chief hold was prohibited, Zbyszko was victorious.

**HOCKEY.**  
News's Record Broken.  
It was a long-standing record set by "News" Lalonde which "Cyclone" Taylor shattered out on the Pacific Coast last week.

Back in 1912, Lalonde, then playing for Vancouver, scored twenty-seven goals in fifteen matches. Playing for Vancouver in a game last week, Taylor went through the Portland defence for four counters, breaking Lalonde's record by a goal. This was in the fifteenth game of the Pacific Coast series, and since then Taylor has been scoring in sensational fashion, netting three in a game against Portland Monday night. It is possible that Taylor may be seen in the Stanley Cup series in the east. Seattle is now in the lead, but under the E. C. H. A. plan, the first and second place teams play off for the title, and in the play-off Vancouver has a good chance of winning.

Says Fulton Has A Chance.  
New York, Mar. 7.—Tom McMahon, a Newcastle heavyweight, who was stopped by Fred Fulton recently, has many complimentary things to say of his conqueror. New York, Mar. 4.—Jess Willard is on the war-path. If he keeps up his stride, first thing he knows he'll find himself matched for a fight.

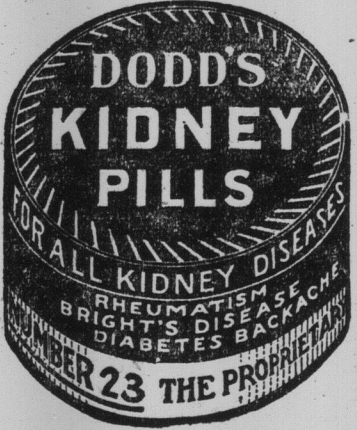
"Of course I'll fight Fulton," says Jess.

**ST. JOHN INTERESTED**

**U. S. Wants Fishermen—Immigration Laws Related to Admit Men From Canada**

(Montreal Gazette.)  
A conference was recently held between representatives of the governments of Canada and the United States with the object of bringing about a material increase during the ensuing year in the output of the North Atlantic fisheries, at which time the fact that the crews of the United States fishing boats are recruited to a large extent from the maritime provinces of Canada, was taken into consideration.

On May 1, 1917, a new United States immigration law went into effect, which prohibited the entry into the United States of non-citizens who are over sixteen years of age and unable to read. The law also made it unlawful for fishermen to enter the United States for the purpose of joining vessels in the port of last country for which they had been engaged.

With a view to overcoming these phases of the law, some side government in pursuit of their calling, will, for the time being, be considered as seamen and regarded as exempt from the operation of the illiteracy features of the immigration law, and they are in possession of good health and character.

United States immigration officers at Halifax and Yarmouth, N. S., and St. John, N. B., have been given instruction by the government officials in Washington, and they are prepared to take care of all fishermen of the class mentioned.

who apply for entry into the United States.  
All fishermen who contemplate taking advantage of the opportunity afforded, should provide themselves with three unmounted, unaltered photographs, measuring 2½ inches by 3½ inches, and call at one of the offices mentioned prepared to pay the head tax of \$8, this amount to be refunded upon compliance with certain conditions which will be made known to them by the United States immigration officers.  
Fishermen who attempt to enter the United States, for the purpose of joining vessels therein, without complying with these regulations, are quite sure to experience delay, as it will be necessary for the border officers to return them to one of the points mentioned.  
During the last season it became necessary for the United States immigration officers to refuse admission to many fishermen because of the immigration law, and the foregoing presents to the natives of our maritime provinces, who have been accustomed for a number of years to enter the United States for the purpose of engaging in the fishing industry, a happy solution of the difficulty.

**BORAH ASKS FOR DEBATE ON RECIPROCAL DRAFT TREATIES.**  
Washington, March 7.—Incidental to a debate over changes in the senate rules, it was revealed today that Senator Borah intends to fight for open debate on the reciprocal draft treaties with Great Britain and Canada, which the foreign relations committee plans to commend for ratification next week.
