SUDDEN DEATH OF REV. E. K. GANONG

(Moncton Times)
Many friends and acquaintances will be painfully shocked to learn of the death of Rev. E. K. Ganong, who passed away very suddenly last evening, while calling at the residence of J. E. Wetmore on Church street. Mr. Ganong, who was in the employ of The Times as traveling representative, had been up to his home in Kings county for Sunday and returned to Moncton on the C. P. R. Monday afternoon. He had intended leaving today on a trip into the country districts, and last evening about 7.30 called at the residence of J. E. Wetmore, proprietor of the Globe Laundry on Church street. Shortly after entering Mr. Wetmore's house, Mr. Ganong complained of a distressed feeling, saying he had eaten a hearty supper. He was suffering so much that he laid down to rest, and Doctor MacNaughton was summoned. After the doctor had prescribed for him, Mr. Ganong felt considerably better. About 9.30 however, Mr. Ganong, after having remarked to Mr. Wetmore that he was feeling much better, suddenly took a weak spell and collapsed. Doctor MacNaughton was again hastily summoned and the stricken man was still alive when he arrived, but he passed away quietly in a few moments.

Mr. Ganong was about fifty-one years old and born at Long Point, Kings county. He married L. Adela Kiersfeldt, May 24, 1886 and is survived by his wife, one daughter, Jean, at home, and one son, Carey, Western Union operator at Charlottetown.

Deceased was an ordained Baptist minister and during his long ministry he held pastorates in many sections of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia. On account of failing health he left the ministry and afterwards was engaged as traveling representative of several newspapers, among them the Telegraph and Times. The deceased had suffered with heart trouble for years, but of late he had apparently better health than for some time past. He was well known throughout the counties of Kings, Westmorland and Albert and many friends will deeply regret to learn of his sudden demise, which comes as a severe blow to his family.

Last night the remains were taken in charge by Funeral Director Tuttle, and will probably be forwarded to his late home at Long Point, Kings county, where interment will take place, probably on Thursday.

Moncton, May 20.—After a funeral service conducted this afternoon by Rev. G. A. Lawson, pastor of the First Baptist church, the body of the late Rev. E. K. Ganong was taken to his former home in Kings county for interment. The service was attended by many friends of the deceased in this city.

MARATHONS IN WINNING FORM

With Temporary Line up Defeated Team at Springvale 6 to 3—Plans For League Opening
The N. B. and Maine League is shaping well towards the opening which will take place at Calais tomorrow, when the border towns will clash with the MacKenzies. A letter received today from Frank J. Leonard, manager of the locals, said that the club was making good progress, and with a fair break of luck they should certainly make things interesting in the league this year. They have been putting in some night practice at Lynn, Portland and Springvale, and yesterday defeated the team from the latter place by a score of 6 to 3, thus winning their first game of the season.

A Bangor despatch says it was a fast and interesting game and the visitors showed up well. Deidrich and Shanley took turns at pitching. The former had four strikes-out, the latter two. Hits off Deidrich were one in five innings, off Shanley, four in four. Riley, the only local player on the team, and who Mr. Leonard says shows much promise, played third base in good style and had a three base hit, and Deidrich also had a three-sacker. The team played consistently throughout, even though some of the men were not playing in their regular positions. O'Brien did not figure in the game, as he did not join the team until they reached Portland, but he will be on hand for the opening game tomorrow in Calais. The team will arrive there tomorrow morning and spend the first few hours in practice.

Another new pitcher has been signed, a Philadelphian, but his name was not forwarded today, as he has not yet coupled with his team-mates. He has a very satisfactory record, as has Walsh, a southpaw from the New Bedford club, who has also been signed. Mulligan, who played a fast game at first base in the initial game of the season at Springvale, was with the Lynn club last year. The complete line-up in the game was: Waterhouse, ss.; Little, C.; Curry, 1b.; Nolan, 2b.; Bien, c.; Hoffman, c.f.; Rhey, 3b.; Mulligan, 1b.; Deidrich and Shanley, p. O'Brien, who played left, is a catcher, and Riley at third was there because of O'Brien's not having joined the team, so that it might only be called a temporary line-up, but it is encouraging to note that they won just the same.

Provincial Secretary McLeod and Mayor Hooper will be the battery for the opening at Fredericton on Friday, and there will be a general big time as a starter to "root" the team to victory. No word has yet been received from Lieut-Governor Wood as to his coming here on Thursday to open the series at the Marathon grounds, but a reply is expected today. Either he or Mayor Frink will toss the first one over.

It is reported that 1200 Swiss leave on Thursday to join the team at the Mormons at Salt Lake City.

SPRINGHILL MAN WAS LEADING DOUBLE LIFE

Moncton, May 20.—Chief of Police George Smith, of Springhill, N. S., arrived in the city yesterday afternoon with a warrant for the arrest of one George Boutillier, of that place, who has been for some time past working in the I. C. R. new shops here, and who is wanted in the Nova Scotia town on a charge of non-support of his family. On enquiry at the police station he learned from Chief Rideout that the man has been living on Downing street and when the cars with the men from the shops stopped at the corner of Downing and Main streets at five o'clock, Boutillier was arrested.

It became evident, on enquiry, that the man has been for some time past leading a "double life." While his wife and four children have been "on the town" in Springhill, Boutillier has been living with another woman on Downing street here. He was taken back to Springhill by Chief Smith on the six o'clock train. His Moncton affinity was much distressed by his enforced departure, and there was weeping and wailing when the officer prepared to deport him to his former home in Nova Scotia.

WORKMAN INJURED

Woodstock, N. B., May 20.—A workman named Robinson was seriously injured this morning in Dickinson's tannery by a flying belt. He was rushed to the hospital and the doctors found a fracture of the skull. He was operated upon and may pull through.

Wm. White, an old and respected citizen, died this morning, aged 73 years. He suffered a stroke of paralysis a few days ago and did not rally. He is survived by his wife and three sons, who are living in the states.
