NEW YORK, N. Y., April 13 .- The big league pennant races open tomorrow, and it is expected that thousands of baseball fans will welcome back their favorites with open arms. Anticipation of last year's great contest in both leagues, particularly the American League, in which the Washington Senators finally won out, will help to crowd the ball parks in the big cities where the opening games will be played.

In the American League the opening day games are as follows: Cleveland at St. Louis, Chicago at Detroit, Boston at Philadelphia and Washington at New York.

The American League clubs are entering this season with the memories of one of the hardest and most closelybught pennant races in the history of aseball just behind them. There is going to be little let-up, according going to be little let-up, according to pre-season prospects, which about please the fans immensely, for the race last year was one to stir the enthusiasm of the most disinterested follower of the game. One or two clubs may fall by the wayside and be counted out before the second half starts, but the rest give promise of staying in the thick of the conflict.

Any analysis of the American League clubs has generally started with New York, and for the sake of old times, rather than estimated pennant strength, the Yankees again receive the honor. Somehow the mention of the Yankees in baseball circles this year fails to bring about the usual enthusiasm. 

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
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
