

DIANA COMES DOWN  
FROM GARDEN TOWER

Bronze Goddess Removed From  
Madison Square by In-  
genious Sling.

NEW YORK, May 9.—Lately Diana, goddess of the chase, the lady in bronze about whose graceful form such a storm of reproach burst when she was raised to her pedestal above Madison Square Garden many years ago, was lifted down almost reverently this week. With her light and delicate outline silhouetted against the sky, she swung slowly earthward from the top of the tower. Not even the slings and ropes of wreckers could detract from her beauty.

Tedious Work.  
It was slow and careful work, lifting Diana from her pedestal and swinging her to the roof. One of the wreckers of the Joslin Construction Company, went up to the tower and with an acetylene torch cut through the base of the statue. Steel ropes were run from a steel bar under Diana's foot to the base of her neck, where a block was fastened, through which a steel rope ran. This sling was designed so that Diana's weight rested upon her feet, preventing the slings from crushing the thin copper plates.

Once Turned in Wind.  
The statue was then lifted by a derrick and swung over the roof to which it was let down so slowly that the process took nearly three-quarters of an hour.

hour. There were a few cheers from nearby office buildings, the windows of which were filled with observers, as Diana moved and swung about in the air so that she showed her face to those who had seen only her back for many years. Once she was a weather vane and turned with the wind. But when the derrick which served to catch the wind rustled off, the bearings were blocked and she stood immobile. There were many odd dents in her perfect lines which puzzled those who examined her carefully. They seemed to have been made by rather heavy blows, as if a large bird, flying fast, had struck the thin copper and bent it in. The statue was made very light for its size so that it might turn easily in the wind. Last night Diana lay in a more undignified position, but perhaps a more comfortable one than her pose of many years upon one foot. She will be placed in storage for a time, and when the tower from the Garden has been taken down and re-erected south of Gould Hall at New York University, Diana will go back to the top again to arouse the admiration of men who walk like penguins far below her.
