

SUGGEST U. N. B. SUMMER SCHOOL

Associated Alumni Will Ask Senate to Take Action Along This Line

Resolution of Regret on Death of Dr. Thomas Walker

At a meeting of the Associated Alumni of the University of New Brunswick held last evening at the Union Club, a motion was passed that the senate of the university be memorialized to establish a summer school at U. N. B. and that extra mural studies be given and such work to count for a degree.

The gathering was presided over by W. J. S. Myles, president of the Associated Alumni. The only toast proposed was that to the Alma Mater, which was honored by all singing the old college song, "Alma Mater," and replied to by C. J. Milligan, of Moncton, of the class of 1883, who spoke enthusiastically of his student days and of the advantages of the smaller university with the closer contact between teacher and student.

BUSINESS MEETING.
After the dinner a business meeting was held and several resolutions from the council of the Associated Alumni dealt with. Favorable comment was passed on a booklet issued by the U. N. B. Club of Fredericton and dealing largely with athletics and the showing of this year's football team.

The thanks of the meeting were passed to Dr. W. O. Raymond, of Ann Harbor, Mich., and of Dr. W. C. Murray, of Saskatchewan, in presenting to the archives of the university copies of Dr. Raymond's essay, "The Centenary of the University," for which the Douglas gold medal was awarded in 1900. The alumni orator for 1926 is to be announced shortly in the press.

CHANCELLOR JONES.
Dr. C. C. Jones spoke on student affairs in general and of the enlarged enrollment through 86 new students entering U. N. B. last fall, bringing the total enrollment to 218, and of the difficulty the staff of 11 professors had in

arranging for these in the varied courses. He continued to receive letters from alumni all over the country expressing appreciation for receipt of the Alumni Bulletin, published quarterly, and more recently expressing satisfaction with the splendid game played against Montreal English team last November.

SECRETARY'S REPORT.
Dr. H. V. B. Bridges, secretary of the Associated Alumni, reported on the affairs of the association and mentioned in particular greetings received from Capt. H. G. Deedes, a graduate engineer of U. N. B., now located in Central Africa.

Capt. Deedes was a noted football player during his student days and graduated in 1911.

C. J. Milligan, president Moncton U. N. B. Club, reported on the formation of this club with a membership of 20 and of its varied activities.

RESOLUTION OF REGRET.
Dr. W. W. White, a member of the senate of the university, moved a resolution of regret at the death of the late Dr. Thomas Walker, one of the oldest living graduates of King's College, which was the predecessor of U. N. B.

He mentioned that Dr. Walker was at one time a president of the Associated Alumni, of his education at U. N. B. and Edinburgh, his interest in sport, being an ardent horseman and surgeon to the Paris crew, of the high place he held in the medical profession in this city, being at one time president of the General Public Hospital, and of the high regard in which he was held by citizens generally.

The president and secretary were instructed to draft a suitable resolution to be placed on the minutes and a copy to be forwarded to the family of the late Dr. Walker.

ENDOWMENT FUND.
A report was submitted of the work of the committee now engaged on the

\$500,000 endowment fund to be raised as proposed by Sir George E. Foster at Moncton in May, 1925.

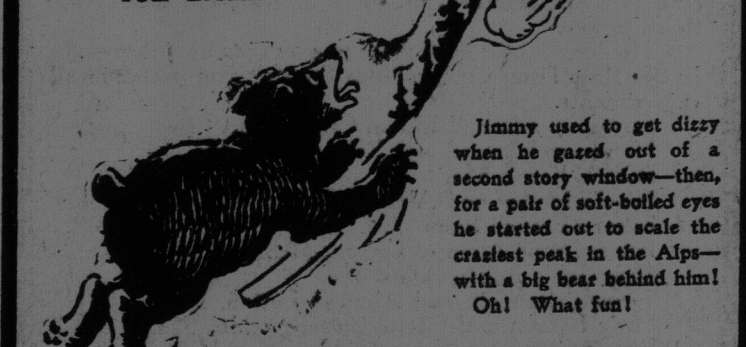

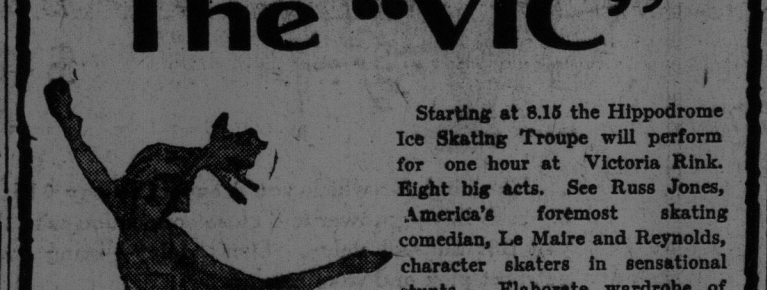
