Once a year these costs are aggregated, and the sum assessed pro rata in license issued to retailers by the county. The extreme length of the line occupied by the Army of the Potomac is not far from sixteen miles.

Fifty American vessels were destroyed during the month of August, twenty-eight of which were destroyed by rebel pirates. Gen. Foster is reported to be preparing a move on Charleston more formidable than any of his defenses have yet had to oppose. What it is none know, but it excites expectations among our officers and men who have so long lain on Morris Island.

About twenty have just been forwarded to England for stocking the Isle of Wight, for hunting purposes. The 1000 pound cannon, a 20-inch gun, at Pittsburg, has been placed in Fort Hamilton, New York. The largest gun ever in any part of the world.

Gen. Sheridan is said to be a native of Boston, where when a boy he sold newspapers in the street. The President has ordered the release of Fort Lafayette of Mr. Mullison, who is implicated with Howard in the proclamation forgery. Justice at last.

The New York ladies are in raptures over the new color, violine. Professor Agassiz is determined to take his Natural History Museum in Cambridge, the useful as well as the magnificent collection in the world. During the past year, no less than 73,000 specimens of animals have been added to it.

In Europe the cotton famine has nearly ceased, and that without the aid of the southern crop. The manufacturers have largely resumed their wonted activity, and are willing to supply most of the world's markets with their products, though at considerable advanced prices.

Sumner Deakin.—Mr. Bartlett, (son of Dr. Bartlett, late editor and proprietor of the New York Albion), who had been in this city for some days on business connected with that excellent paper, was taken ill on Monday last, and not withstanding the most careful medical attendance, the disease resulted in death on Wednesday. His remains were sent to New York for interment on Thursday last. Courier.

H. M. S. Galatia arrived at Quarantine station, Halifax, from Bermuda on Tuesday last with several cases of Yellow Fever on board; one man died during the passage. From the accounts she brought it appears that the fever, still rages in the island. Dr. Gallagher of the Royal Navy has fallen victim since last accounts; two hundred soldiers have died since the breaking out of the epidemic.

The people of Eastport are raising funds to build a new and commodious Hotel which is much wanted in that town. A convention has been selected on Water Street and already a large sum has been subscribed. A similar movement in St. Andrews is much required.

A Richmond papers says that 8000 Federal prisoners died at Andersonville, Ga. during the months of July and August.
