Captain Yagi, in conversation with a Times reporter, stated that the liner had experienced terrific weather for the greater part of the voyage and that, on the night of December 31st, when the Aki Maru was near the meridian, the New Year was ushered in by a cyclonic storm which resulted in the essel sustaining minor damages.
