





Evans, arrived off the Island about 2.30 this morning from Liverpool and Belfast with eight hundred and seventy-two passengers, eighteen first, one hundred and thirty-seven second cabin, and seven hundred and seventeen steerage. She came the long southerly course and passed three huge ice-bergs. Among the third class passengers were one hundred and twenty Salvation Army immigrants bound for the west. Three special trains will carry the passengers west. The Manitoba has about 2,000 tons of cargo.
