### LOCAL NEWS

At six o'clock this morning the Empress of Britain was reported 120 miles east of Sable Island.

The steamer Cohan, with a cargo of coal, docked at the Dominion coal piers this morning.

The monthly tournament of the city Bowling League will be held on Black's alleys this evening.

Workmen are busy white-washing the ceilings of the Union Station and brightening up the interior.

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In the Roman-Catholic churches today, the blessing of the throats is taking place.

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The congregation of St. James' Church, Broad street, will hold a social on Friday evening, Feb. 4, at eight o'clock, to which all members of the church and their friends are cordially invited to attend.

Mr. and Mrs. Andrew M. Johnston of 118 Harrison street will have the sympathy of the community in the loss of their infant daughter, Alice Josephine, who died today at the age of eleven months. The funeral will be held on Saturday afternoon.

J. L. Binings, of Montreal, is in the city today on a visit to the local office of the Furness Line. Mr. Binings is manager of the Montreal office of Furness, Wyley & Co. and is on a trip of inspection to the branch office. He has just returned from Halifax.

The London Standard says that Hugh A. Allan, the new chairman of the Allan Line, has completed his re-organizing of the Allan Steamship programme, and will build two new boats of 12,000 tons. The Allan Line fleet comprises 27 vessels of 100,000 aggregate tonnage.

At the annual meeting of the Freeman Publishing Company, held in their office on Canterbury street last evening, the retiring board of directors was re-elected. A meeting of the directors followed at which Thomas Kirkham was re-elected president; M. E. Agar, vice-president, and J. W. V. Lawlor, managing director.

A passenger on the Pacific express received the surprise of his life when he was arrested last evening at the Union Depot. He was simply passing through the city and was waiting for the west bound train to pull out when he was nabbed by a local constable and forced to come to a settlement with a city merchant before being allowed to proceed.

A violently insane woman reached the city today and will be deported on the Coriscan tomorrow. She is a German and comes from the Allan Line. During the trip from Brandon to Winnipeg the woman was very violent and gave her male attendant a lot of trouble. On one occasion she knocked the news agent down and pelted the other passengers with the fruit which she took from his basket. After that episode she was secured and has traveled and other passengers since then with her hands and feet strapped.

### DECISION WILL AFFECT NEWSPAPER READERS

#### Railway Commission Upsets Existing Arrangements for News Services—Companies Will Jump Their Rates.

A recent decision of the Board of Railway Commissioners, who also have jurisdiction over telegraph business, will seriously affect all the newspapers of the Dominion which are in the habit of receiving their news by wire. The most important feature of the ruling is the clause forbidding the telegraph companies to furnish or transmit news services at a flat rate of so much per week. As all the Associated Press, the Canadian Associated Press and the Western Associated Press matter is handled at flat rates at present, the newspapers simply paying a fixed rate and receiving everything sent out by the central bureau, the change will materially affect their telegraphic service. The change will not be for the better is certain, as at the inquiry the C. P. R. Telegraph Company, which controls the Associated Press in Canada, claimed that they lost \$50,000 on this feature last year and will find it necessary to raise their rates under the new system.

Representatives of the telegraph companies and the newspapers have been called to meet in Montreal next Tuesday to discuss the matter and try to come to a working arrangement. The trouble arose over a complaint of unduly discrimination which was made by the Western Associated Press which is an organization formed by the Winnipeg papers to protect themselves against the telegraph companies. The association formerly paid so much per word but later secured an agreement for a flat rate. This rate was higher than that which the C. P. R. Company charged for the Associated Press service and this was one cause for the complaint.

After the matter was thrashed out the Commission refused to force the same rate and instead declared that the whole flat rate arrangement was illegal and ordered that it be discontinued and that about February all matter be charged at a word rate. The Commission also directed all telegraph companies to prepare and publish a tariff of their rates and that the rates given should apply to everyone without any discrimination.

As a large proportion of the telegraph news which appears in the St. John papers is supplied by the Associated Press at the flat rate, the subscribers will suffer the loss of a lot of interesting reading if the telegraph companies seize this opportunity to increase their rates at a rate that will be prohibitive on all but the most important news. The matter will, however, be thoroughly discussed.

### PASSENGERS ARRIVE FOR DEPARTING STEAMERS

Athena Outward This Afternoon—Coriscan to Take a Large Party Tomorrow.

Donaldson liner Athena will sail this afternoon between 5 and 6 o'clock for Glasgow. The steamer will carry a number of cabin passengers. The seventy-five steamer passengers arrived on the Montreal express at noon. A special train left the depot at 12:30 to take them, and other passengers who had previously arrived, around to West St. John. Most of the passengers were for the Coriscan and the balance will go forward by the Athena.

The Allan liner Coriscan sails for Liverpool with about 25 cabin, 60 second cabin and 150 steerage passengers. C. P. R. steamer Empress of Britain will reach Halifax this afternoon. The majority of 1,200 passengers will come around to St. John.

C. P. R. steamer Monteuma, for London, carried 237 head of cattle.

### NEW SAILING LIST FOR THE ALLAN LINE

Turners are Soon to be Put on This Route—A Weekly Service Hereafter.

Revised sailing lists received at the local Allan Line office show a number of changes in the movements of the big steamers for the balance of the season. The company's business warrants the continuance of a weekly service between St. John, Halifax and Liverpool. After their next voyage to this port, the Hesperian and Grandiosa will be taken from the route, to go on the Boston and Glasgow service. The Grandiosa leaves Liverpool on Thursday of next week on her last voyage to this port. She will sail from St. John on Saturday, Feb. 12. The Hesperian will sail from St. John on her last trip to Liverpool on Saturday, March 12.

During the remainder of the season the service between St. John, Halifax and Liverpool will be performed by the Coriscan, Tunisian, Virginian and Victorian, royal mail steamers. These should apply to everyone without any Line fee. The Coriscan will sail from No. 3 berth at Sand Point tomorrow. She is commanded by Captain J. T. Gambell.
