EX-MAYOR BINGHAM MAY HAVE BEEN DROWNED.

OTTAWA, June 18—Ex-Mayor Samuel Bingham of Ottawa left here Saturday on his lumber business. His horse and rig were found in the water near Wakefield, some thirty miles from town, but Bingham was missing. He is said to have had from \$7,000 to \$10,000 in his possession when he left Ottawa to pay the workmen. Hundreds of people are searching for his body today with the best possible grappling apparatus, it being generally believed he was drowned in attempting to cross the river. Bingham while mayor of Ottawa distributed his salary to charitable purposes, never appropriating a cent to his own use. There is a rumor that he was killed by thugs, but this is unsubstantiated. If his body is found with the money intact, it will show merely an accident.

\$30,000 FIRE AT SYDNEY.

HALIFAX, June 18.—The manufacturing factory of Chapel Brothers at Sydney, was completely destroyed Saturday morning. The loss is estimated at \$30,000, covered by \$7,000 in insurance. The fire was the worst that occurred in Sydney since that of 1901. Insurance is held by Queen and London and Liverpool companies, each for \$25,000. While the cause of the fire is unknown it is believed to be the work of an incendiary. The factory employed about 30 hands, all of whom are thrown out of employment.
