EXPLANATORY.

I. VIRWS ON THR VOYAGE FROM MILETUS TO TYRE.—VS 1-3. Having torn themselves away with reluctance and grief from the elders of Epheeus (for so the verb GOTTEN FROM means), Paul and his companious proceeded on their voyage. "The ship evidently stopped every evening. The reacon lies in the wind, which, in the Ægean during the summer, generally blows from the north, beginning at a very early hour in the morning. In the late afternoon it dies away, and at sunset there is a dead calm."

The first stop, after sailing forty miles in a southerly direction, was at Coos (Greek Cos), a small island of great commercial importance, and a financial centre, off the coast of Carla, in Asis Minor. It was of especial interest to Luke, because it was the seat of one of the great medical schools of the ancient world traditionally connected with Escolaplus; and because it was the birthplace of Hippocrates, a famous Greek physician, and "founder of the school of a relentific art of healing." whose works no doubt Luke had read, for some are still extant. Some ancient writers think it was also the birthplace of Apel'es, the most celebrated of Grecian painters.

"According to the proverb the sun shone every day on Rhodes, and it might well be called 'the sunny island of roses."
