

ROBBERY ON BRADING STREET

Store of Phillip Grannan broken into and two dollars and several knives stolen.

Some time early yesterday morning the store of Phillip Grannan, M. L. A., Main street, was broken into. The cash register broken open and about two dollars stolen. The robbery is thought to have been the work of boys. The entrance was made from the rear, the robbers going from Acadia street, breaking a window and gaining entrance to the workshop and then into the front store.

In speaking about the robbery last night Mr. Grannan said that he thought that boys were responsible for the break and said it would be wise for the merchants to clear their registers of any money and leave the registers unlocked and thus save any damage being done. The police have been notified of the case, but as there was no clue left, the task of getting hold of the guilty persons is hard.

GOV. GENERAL HAS BUSY DAY AT ST. JOHN'S

Lays Cornerstone of New Sanitarium for White Plague Sufferers — Foreign Warships in Port for Festivities.

St. John's, Nfld., July 15.—The Duke of Connaught had a specially busy time today. He landed at ten o'clock this forenoon in full uniform from the warship Essex, which thundered a salute as he left for the shore. He was received by the Governor, Premier, Chief Justice, the cabinet ministers, Anglican and Catholic bishops, other church heads, municipal councillors and foreign consuls.

The mayor presented an address, to which the Duke replied. In his reply he sympathetically referred to the recent sealing disaster, five of whose survivors he visited at the hospital yesterday.

Afterwards His Royal Highness opened the newly built extension of the department for girls in the King George V. Institute, and was presented with an album of 24 photographs of the building. As a souvenir he presented his photograph for the Grenfell Hall in the main lecture room.

He then reviewed one thousand uniformed members of the boys' brigades of the different departments, who executed regimental evolutions, and amid cheering scenes from the enthusiastic crowds, the duke made a brief speech praising the fine display and urging the boys to develop manly qualities.

Continued from page 1. General Villa, his staff and a small escort, arrived today at Juarez to spend a few days at the border. The northern divisional commander is expected to return south and have his entire army moving towards Mexico City within eight days. The Villa troops are spread over seven in Chihuahua, while at Juarez General Villa will arrange for supplies. While it is known that his supply of artillery ammunition is ample, he is short of rifle cartridges.

"I would much prefer that Huerta had remained in the presidential chair, or in Mexico City, until we could get our hands on him," General Villa said today in Juarez when he learned of Huerta's resignation.

"That is the only comment I care to make on the subject," he added. "I am a soldier of my country and do not care to express my opinion of the traitor's resignation."

Columbus, New Mexico, July 16.—The annihilation today of the Constitutionalist garrison at Palomas, Chihuahua, by Federal regulars, broke the Mexican problem. The garrison, which was believed to consist of several hundred men, was completely destroyed.

Gomez announced today that he would leave during the night, and it is believed he will make no attempt to hold the town against troops from Juarez or Casasgranda. It was learned that 200 men from the Pearson garrison, almost directly south, had been sent by General Villa to retake the place.

Washington Rejoiced at News. Washington, July 15.—News of General Huerta's resignation as president of Mexico was hailed by official Washington tonight as the first practical step toward a quick solution of the Mexican problem.

The Constitutionalists have declared they would not recognize Carvajal as provisional president any more than they did his predecessor, and the United States government likewise will refuse to recognize him. The understanding here is, however, that the new executive will hold office for but a short time—only until satisfactory arrangements can be made for the entry of General Carranza, the Constitutionalists' chief.

YOUNG LADY STUDENT AT BIOLOGICAL STATION

Studying Sea Life at Joe's Point Near St. Andrews — Research Work Under Way.

Special to The Standard. St. Andrews, July 14.—The marine biological station at Joe's Point is again in full swing, and the season's research work is well under way. Dr. J. W. Mayor of the University of Wisconsin, is the curator in charge of the station, and has associated with him, as assistant curator, Dr. Phillip Cox of the University of New Brunswick.

During the past few years the student investigators who have been coming to the station from various colleges in Canada and the United States, in order to study marine life in its various forms, as found in the waters of this vicinity, have been composed entirely of young men, but this year witnesses a departure from the old order of things, and for the first time in the history of the station, we find a young lady investigator hard at work among the eels and jelly fish, and all such slimy creatures of the sea.

The students are all very enthusiastic over their work, and hope to accomplish much during their stay here. Captain Mitchell and Engineer Arthur Calder are again in charge of the boats in connection with the station.
