Premiers in Conference Are Acquainted With Real Intentions of the Bolshevik.

REFUSED TO TAKE MESSAGES FROM

Warsaw, Aug. 8—The foreign office announced last evening that the Soviet wireless operator at Moscow had refused for a third time to receive the Polish government's message announcing that Poland would send delegates to a Bolsheviki-Polish peace conference at Minsk. The Soviet operator declafed that he was too busy to accept the despatch. Prior to this refusal the Polish government received a wireless despatch from Moscow expressing surprise that the Polish peace delegation, which returned from the unsuccessful meeting last week at Baranovitchi had not yet gone to Minsk.

BOLSHEVIK REFUSE BRITISH PROPOSITION

Belief Prevails That the Blockade Against Russia Will Be

ade Against Russia Will Be Imposed Within 48 Hours. Hythe, England, Aug. 8.—The Bolsheviki Government has refused the proposition contained in the British Government's last note to conclude a ten days' truce with Poland. On the receipt of this decision, David Lloyd George, the British Prime Minister, and M. Millerand, the French Premier, began to discuss the best means for immediately assisting Poland. The conference was still in session at 7 o'clock this evening, and it was believed likely that it would continue through Monday.

The belief prevails here that, unless the Bolsheviki alter their apparent intention to take Warsaw, the blockade against Russia will be reimposed within forty-eight hours.

SOVIETS FLIRTING WITH RUMANIA
