WANT BRITISH  
MOVIES PLACED  
ON FREE LISTS

Plea Before Commission is  
Supported by Lady Pope and  
Former Press Censor.

Ottawa, Jan. 3.—The importance of placing moving picture films of British manufacture on the free list was emphasized before the tariff commission this afternoon by Col. A. A. Magee, representing the Anglo-Canadian Picture Plays, Limited. Colonel Magee explained to the commission that it was practically impossible under present conditions for the British film to compete with the American film. The British film was the equal, if not the superior of the American production, and it was felt that a certain amount of encouragement.

Lady Pope Supports.

Lady Pope, appearing on behalf of the Daughters of the Empire, supported Colonel Magee. Colonel Ernest J. Chambers, who acted as chief press censor during the war, explained that German propaganda had been carried on extensively in the United States through the moving picture film. The moving picture industry in the United States had been at that time largely in the hands of German Jews. He became convinced that the moving picture industry had been sold out body and soul to interests inimical to Great Britain and Canada. He had therefore interested himself in getting British films into Canada, a very different problem during the war. Conditions were different now. The British manufacturer wanted to sell in Canada, and should be encouraged.

Fredricton, N. B., Jan. 3.—When Herbert G. Winter returned to his office as appraiser at the Customs house this morning after the holiday he commenced his fifty-first year as an official of the Federal Government. Half a century of work as a civil servant was completed when he closed up his desk on Friday night, for he had been appointed to a clerkship in the Fredericton Customs house on Jan. 1, 1871, and had served continuously from that date at various positions in the same office.

He is seventy years old, but continues to carry on his public duties in a manner which gives general satisfaction not only to his superiors, but to the business community, with which he is brought in close touch in his work as appraiser of the port.



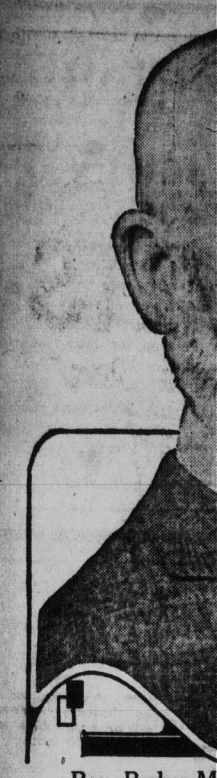

London, Jan. 3.—"After months' stay and observation in Europe, my appreciation of the condition and opportunities of our country is strengthened. In lighter taxation, greater freedom from war, or want, the opportunities for improvement are abundant. With a more hopeful outlook for the future, and a less obstructive background of casualties and suffering, contrast is wonderfully in our favor. With disordered credit and finances, and confused exchange rates, the economic situation is certainly growing no better. Present living conditions are as tolerable and the future, is distinctly uncertain for the nation. They are reaping the harvest of the most severe war. Canadians have borne burdens and ties, but not comparable with Europe. We shall overcome much more easily, and earlier than the other countries. We will receive great contribution from very best European immigration which is now looking anxiously for freer areas. It only remains for our house in order for the development which is certain to follow. To all Canadians then, Hope and Best Wishes for the future."
