Rejuvenation of
 Woman Possible

Five Hundred Treated in a
 Recent Clinic at Vienna—
 Results Favorable.

Vienna, Feb. 16.—"New chorus girls for old" may result from Professor Holtschneider's use of the Roentgen ray for "rejuvenation" of women, he declared today in discussing his discovery with a representative of the United Press.

Holtschneider declared he had already succeeded through his treatment in bringing back the youth of an actress, formerly a singer only of melancholy songs, who now has become a successful actress as a result of application of the rays.

Holtschneider is a young man who was associated with Prof. Stannich, famous "rejuvenator" but while his father's process has proved effective for both sexes, Holtschneider's methods have been applied more especially to women.

Five hundred women were examined in a Vienna clinic and the growth in energy among women between 40 and 60 years of age in social activities was noticeable. These women became fresher and jovialer, their skin was firmer and their mood better, and actually they gave the impression of having been rejuvenated.

Holtschneider said that only one treatment was possible, but that its effect was "quite prolonged."

Isaac H. Stearns.

Montreal, Feb. 14.—Isaac H. Stearns, probably the oldest Free Mason in Canada and certainly in the province of Quebec, died here last night at a very advanced age.

For fifty years it is claimed that he only missed one meeting of the Grand Lodge of the Province of Quebec. He was a past grand master of the lodge and only last week had been appointed grand treasurer (emeritus) at the meeting of Quebec Masons here.

The death of Norah Louise, eldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William H. Pearson, of Highfield, Queens Co., on Friday, the 11th inst., came as a shock to the community at large. The deceased was twenty years of age, had been in poor health for several years, but not until quite recently did it become serious as to cause the greatest anxiety and which terminated so suddenly.

The deceased young lady was possessed of a lovable disposition, leaving a host of friends which was amply testified to by the large number of friends and neighbors who gathered to pay their last tribute of respect to one they loved.

The funeral was held on Sunday, burial being made in the Church of England burying ground, the service being conducted by the rector, the Rev. C. A. S. Harnford. The deceased leaves her parents, two brothers and three sisters to mourn.

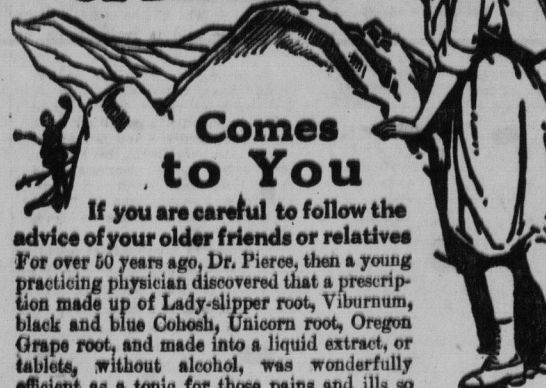
