Black's bowling team with four wins and no losses was leading the field when the first day of the Brunswick and Eastern Maine Bowling Championships was brought to a close last night. The Y. M. C. I. championship of 1921, and the Calais, Me., team were tied for second place with two wins and one loss.

Jenkins of the Y. M. C. I. team made the highest single string total yet recorded with 123 to his credit, while Jenkins of Black's team and Anderson of the Calais team each rolled for 122. The highest three string total of the day, 309, was also made by Jenkins of Black's team and Anderson of the Calais team. The Y. M. C. I. team of Fredericton rolled 308, and Harrington of the Y. M. C. I. rolled 297.

Smith of Amherst made the highest average of the day, 106.3, and Norwood of Calais was second with 100.1, and Jenkins of the Y. M. C. I. was third with 100.

The Y. M. C. I. had the highest total pin fall of the day, 1421. The games will be continued today, the first two beginning at 9 o'clock. Rotation playing the Y. M. C. I. and Amherst playing Black's. The last game in the tournament will be rolled at 6:30 p.m., following which the challenging bowling teams will be the guests of the Y. M. C. I. at a banquet to be served in the gym.

Oxford-Cambridge Were Victorious

By Score of Four to Three Over Scalp and Blades of Buffalo—Points Tie Broken

New York, April 18.—By its victory yesterday of 4 to 3 over the Scalp and Blades teams of Buffalo, the Oxford-Cambridge University twelve of England managed to break the tie in total points that had accumulated in the eight games it previously played in competition for the International Lacrosse Trophy.

To win the trophy the sum total of the Oxford-Cambridge scores must be greater than the combined scores of the American teams it plays. The score is now 41 to 40. The invaders hope to add further points by defeating Cornell at Ithaca tomorrow.

Managers Hold Out For Larger Purse

Johnny Kilbane and Eugene Criqui, French Champion, May Not Fight in France.

Paris, April 18.—It was considered probable in boxing circles today that the proposed 20-round bout between Johnny Kilbane, world's champion featherweight boxer, and Eugene Criqui, French featherweight champion would not take place in France.

The offer for a purse of 500,000 francs has failed to arouse much enthusiasm in either camp. Kilbane's manager is holding out for \$50,000, which is equivalent to nearly 700,000 francs, while Criqui's desire to meet the champion is not equal to his paying his own training expenses and running the risk of receiving no money.

Marathon Classic To Be Run Today

Seventy-Eight Men Line Up for the Word Over Boston Course.

Boston, April 18.—Seventy-eight men of many nationalities and occupations were ready, tonight, for the twenty-fifth running of the American marathon over the 26 mile Ashland-Boston course. The field will be the strongest that ever ran in the classic, it seemed probable tonight that the runners would have a cold westerly wind at their backs at the good condition by tonight's shower.

The course, which covers an undulating countryside, was put into good condition by tomorrow's shower. Six former winners are entered including Frank Zula, a plumber from Newark, N. J., who last year broke the record when he ran the 26 miles in 2 hours, 15 minutes, 37 seconds. Other former winners who will attempt to repeat are Trivitt, the New York Greek winner in 1920 and third place man last year; Carl W. A. Linder, of the Boston Athletic Association, 1919; Edward Fabre, of Montreal, 1915; William J. Kennedy, Morningstar, A. C. New York, 1917, and C. C. De Mar, Dorchester, 1911. Nine of the first ten finishers in 1921 will be in the lineup tomorrow.
