The principal cause of delay on the part of the contractor is believed to arise from his extensive desire to accommodate the travelling public, to wit: by putting six or eight passengers with their baggage and Her Majesty's mails in a rickety vehicle drawn by a pair of old horses, to the tune of two dollars and fifty cents for a thirty-eight mile drive! It is alleged there is much time lost at Shediae in "packing and stowing" the unfortunate travellers in the contractor's vehicle, hence the delay in arriving on time at Richibucto. I would suggest to the Hon. Post Office Inspector the immediate necessity of administering to the contractor a "mild reproof"—something that will wake him up to realize a sense of his duty as a public servant, and if possible to show Mr. Carpenter the difference between a mail contractor and male carrier.
