Page reports that the increase of interest in baseball in Canada since the war will draw something like \$75,000 for the exhibition games which they have been planned tentatively.

### RACING RESUMED

Paris, May 4.—The resumption of racing on the French tracks after nearly five years of interruption, is helping Paris to realize that fighting is at an end. The season will open on Monday at Maisons Lafitte. 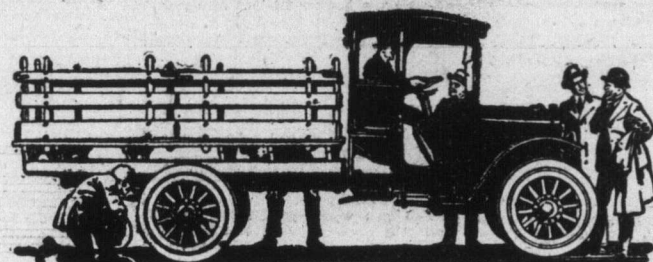

# SUM Summary Pea

A NUMBER OF MAIN FEATURES

PARIS, May 7. (Canadian Press)—The treaty of Peace between twenty-seven Allies and Associated powers on the one hand and Germany on the other was handed to the German plenipotentiaries at Versailles today.

It is the longest treaty ever drawn. It totals about eighty thousand words divided into fifteen main sections. It represents the combined product of over thousand experts, working continually, through a series of commissions, since January 1918. The treaty is printed in parallel pairs of English and French. It does not deal with questions affecting Austria, Bulgaria and Turkey, except insofar as it is binding on Germany to accept any agreement reached with its former allies.

Following the preamble and definition of powers, comes the covenants of the League of Nations, as the first section of the treaty. Following sections deal with the frontiers. Germany in Europe; European political classes; naval, military and air forces; prisoners of war and military graves; responsibilities for the war reparations; ports, waterways and financial terms; economic terms; armaments; labor covenant; section guarantees and final clauses.

**THE TERMS IMPOSED**  
Germany, by the terms of the treaty, restores Alsace-Lorraine to France; temporarily accepts the internationalization of the Saar Basin and of Danzig permanently. She agrees to territorial changes toward Belgium and Denmark in East Prussia cedes most of Upper Silesia to Poland.

And renounces all territorial and political rights outside of Europe, to her own or her Allies' territories especially to Morocco, Egypt, Syria, Liberia and Shantung.

The total independence of Germany, Austria, Czechoslovakia and Poland is recognized.

Her army is reduced to one hundred thousand men; conscription her territories is abolished; all fifty kilometers east of the Rhine are to be razed; and all imports and exports and nearly all production of war materials is stopped.

Until reparation is made the all occupation of parts of Germany will be continued but a reduced made at the end of each year per Germany fulfills her obligations.

Any violation of the conditions to the zone fifty kilometers east of the Rhine, will be regarded as an act of war.

The German navy is reduced to six battleships, six light cruisers, twelve torpedo boats, without submarines. The personnel of not over fifteen thousand sailors is permitted.

**THOSE WHO ARE INCLUDED**  
**ALLIED POWERS.**

The preamble names as the par of the one part, the United States, British Empire, France, Italy and Japan who are described as the five all associated powers and Belgium, Bolivia, Brazil, China, Cuba, Ecuador, Greece, Guatemala, Haiti, Thailand, Honduras, Liberia, Nicaragua, Panama, Portugal, Rumania, Serbia, Silesia, Czechoslovakia, Uruguay and who with the five above, described as all associated powers. And on other part Germany.

**EXPLANATIONS OF TERMS**  
Germany under the treaty accepts full responsibility for all damage caused the allied and associated governments and her delegates agree specifically to reimburse all civilian damages beginning with initial payment 20,000,000,000 francs (\$4,000,000,000).

Germany is also to pay shipping damages, on a ton-for-ton basis by the cession of a large part of merchant coasting and river fleet. She must devote her economic resources to the rebuilding of the devastated regions.

Must demolish Hindenburg, open Kiel canal to all nations and surrender fourteen submarine cables. She also must agree to return to 1914 most-favored-nation tariffs, without discrimination. Will allow allied nations freedom of transit through her territories and agree to accept high detailed provisions, as to pre-war del internationalization of roads, rivers and other economic and financial clauses.

Also she will be required to accept the trial of former Kaiser by international high court. Holland to be asked to extradite Wilhelm, Germany being responsible for delivering him.

The League of Nations is accepted by the allies as operative and by Germany.
