Camp Borden, Aug. 26 (Special).—The Breadner Shield, donated for annual competition by Air Marshal L. S. Breadner, was captured by No. 2 Squadron, No. 1 Service Flying Training School, at the annual sports day of R.C.A.F. Station, Camp Borden, today. It represents inter-squadron championship in field events.

Camp Borden, Aug. 26 (Special).—Royal Canadian Air Force and 26th Army Tank Battalion (Grey and Simcoe Foresters), played a thrilling 8-8 draw at Camp Borden tonight in the second game of the Camp Borden Baseball championship series—a best three of five schedule.
