COMMUNICATION FROM THE ITALIAN GOVERNMENT.

Rome, April 8th, 1936.

To the Secretary-General.

(Translated from
the Italian)

Ethiopian telegram regarding alleged Italian attack on Addis Ababa of April 4th* is as usual tendencious and false. The facts are that a flight of five machines under Captain Falconi, while making one of the usual reconnaissance flights, observed an Ethiopian aeroplane on its way from Dessye to Addis Ababa and pursued it, pushing as far as the aerodrome at the capital, where with machine-guns, these being their sole weapons, they attacked it, together with another machine standing there. The Italian aeroplanes underwent heavy anti-aircraft fire which hit them in several places but did not prevent them from duly returning to Sardo. The Abyssinian fire also hit Captain Falconi, who was wounded by a dum-dum bullet in the left side of the jaw, and Sergeant-Mechanic Di Cristo, who was wounded, also by a dum-dum bullet, in the left knee. The wounded men were immediately conveyed to Asmara, where it was found necessary to amputate Sergeant Di Cristo's left leg above the knee owing to the comminuted nature of the wound produced by the dum-dum bullet. This correct and full statement of the facts shows:- (1) That no attack was made on Addis Ababa, but only on military aircraft in the aerodrome of that city under the circumstances above stated. (2) That from the alleged open and undefended city of Addis Ababa there was violent anti-aircraft fire which hit all the machines and seriously wounded two airmen. (3) That the Abyssinians are continuing to use inhuman ammunition forbidden by the international Conventions.
