

FOURTH WITNESS, Lieut N.B.Weston having been duly sworn stated,  
I am Lieut N.B.Weston, A Coy Lake Sup R (M). On the evening of 9th May 45 Pte Heibert showed me a typewriter which he said he had bought from Pte Dwinski, W. I assisted him in changing the ribbon from black to black and red.  
On the evening of 10 May 45 Sgt-Major McLean phoned me and told me Pte Dwinski was under arrest for house-breaking and that Sgt DeCreane and Sgt Brisson were coming to inspect his kit. I questioned Pte Dwinski on this charge and he stated knew nothing about it. None of the missing articles were found in his kit.  
On the morning of 12 May 45 I was speaking to Sgt-Major McLean and he mentioned a black typewriter with a trade name Erica. I immediately thought of the typewriter which was in the possession of Pte Heibert. That afternoon it was identified by the owner Mrs Anna Oeffermann as one of the stolen typewriters.

The accused declined to question the witness.

FIFTH WITNESS H-23261 Pte Heibert, D. having been duly sworn states,  
I am H-23261 Pte Heibert E, A Coy Lake Sup R (M)  
On the evening of 9th May 45 Pte Dwinski approached me and said he had a typewriter to trade. I wanted a typewriter and traded him a small women watch for it. I did not ask him where he had got the typewriter. He said the ribbon was not very good. I got a ribbon from Mr Weston and Pte Dwinski put it in the typewriter. He did not put it in correctly and Mr Weston showed me how it should be and helped me change it.

The accused declined to question the witness.

The accused was warned as follows, *H-23261 Pte Heibert D*  
Do you wish to make a statement or to give evidence on oath? You are not obliged to say anything or to give evidence unless you wish to do so, but whatever you say or any evidence you give will be taken down in writing and may be given in evidence.

A. I wish to make a statement on oath.

STATEMENT BY THE ACCUSED

H-42331 Pte Dwinski having been duly sworn states,  
On the second day we were in the new area I was out for a walk and met two Polish Civilians. They were carrying a lot of clothes and a box. I asked them what was in the box, one of them answered that it was a typewriter. I asked him for it and he gave it to me. The ribbon was not very good and I only wrote on letter and offered to trade it to Pte Heibert. He got me another ribbon which I put in the typewriter. He gave me a watch for the typewriter.
