# SHOOTING STARS

ook out For a Big Swarm of Them in the

Astronomers all over the country Astronomers all over the country are anxiously wondering whether the freat Leonid swarm expected November 13, 14 and 15, of last year and the year before, will come this year. For two years past devotees of the science have watched the beginner patiently and corresplit on heavens patiently and carefully on the three nights for the coming of this most famous shower of shooting stars, only to be disappointed. On November 14, 1897, a few of the

On November 14, 1897, a few of the Leonids were seen, but a year later to the day, the watchers were trewarded with a brilliant display, in which about 800 were noted. November 14, 1899, the astronomers, armed with the latest photographic weapons, again awaited the display, and from 100 to 200 were recorded. Last year there were no substantial results, elthough something more than 100 were noted altogether in northern latitudes, principally at Yale and Harvard. Yale and Harvard. These records, however, are nothing

to the glorious display of the past, the Arabs of the ninth century recording the appearance of a "rain of stars." The Chinese also tell of womderful and awe-inspiring exhibitions in the heavens. From that time to this they have been noted with fair regularity every 33 years or so, the this they have been noted with fair regularity every 33 years or so, title last first class shower in this country being on November 14, 1833. On November 14, 1866, they appeared again, the largest display in 1867. By some it is chaimed that the 33 year period would therefore bring them back in 1900, but on the other hand it has been shown that the period of the swarm has been lengthening, and must now be close to 34 years. This calculation would assign to-night as the proper time for their appearance.

The constellation Leonis rises short-The constellation Leonis rises shortly before midnight to-night, but it is not well in view till it a. m. It can be found readily by using the pointers in the Dipper in a reverse direction from the customary use in finding the North Star. Leonis will be identified about as far off as the North Star is the other way, and as a very good outline of a sickle, with the bright star Regullus at the outer end of the handle. A better way is to use the two stars forming the side of the Dipper nearest the handle for pointers. These point again in the direction opposite to the North Star, directly at the sickle. The radiant of the Leonitis within the curve of the blade of the sickle, near the center. The whole of the constellation, how-The whole of the constellation, how-ever, does not come into good view until about 2 o'clock in the morning.
