GOVERNMENT BILL FORBIOS RETENTION OF PART OF WAGES

Will Put a Stop to Practice of Employers Keeping Workmen's Money For Premiums on Insurance.

Quebec, February 16 .- Details of the Government bill regarding the detention of sums of money out of workingmen's wages for insurance charges are ob-tainable to-day by the text of the bill. The preamble declares: whereas certain employers retain out of the wages of their workmen amounts intended to pay premiums on insurance-policies issued against accidents happening by reason of or in the course of their work and serious inconvenience assuits the serious assuits as a serious assuits as a serious as their work and serious inconvenience results there

The bill then proceeds with a proposed amendment to the revised statutes to the following effect:
"It is forbidden for any employer to make any retention of any part of the salary or wages of his workmen or employes for purposes of insurance against accidents happening by reason of or in the course of their work, even with the consent of such

workmen or employes. "Any agreement under which such a retention is made or authorized shall be null and of no effect. "In any case where such retention is made, the workman or employe, in the three months following the end of his contract of work, may recover, before any court of competent jurisdiction, the amount so

irrekularly withheld from his salary or wages." This act shall not apply to any retentions which may have been legally made before its coming into
