ADVOCATES THE PUBLIC CON-TROL OF PRIVATE CORPORA-

"An important condition in the industrial development of this country," said Cardinal Gibbons, in an interview in Baltimore recently, "is the fact that the right of the people to fair and honest treatment by the big business interests is daily becoming more widely recognized by broadminded and progressive men. Laws are being passed and enforced for the proper regulation and control of great corporations, particularly public service companies, and ticularly public service companies, and the rights of the people are each year being better guarded and protected. This is as it should be; it creates honesty in business relations, and with-out honesty there can be no real pro-gress.

"The public has a right to exercise intelligent control over corporations which serve it with necessities. Through his instrumentality and the munificence of Mr. Eugene O'Keefe the crowning work of his regime came into being—the building of St. Augustine's Seminary. more elaborate than ordinary, but they were in keeping with the occasion. The black vestments of those taking part in the Mass contrasted with the purple robes of the archbishops and bishops robes of the archbishops and bishops while above them all shone out the lights

from the altar.

The choir was composed of over a hundred male voices, men and boys, under the leadership of Mr. A. Leithusunder the leadership of Mr. A. Leithuser, who took the solo parts. The singing was strictly Gregorian, and except for the final benedictions did not differ from that rendered at the funeral of the humblest child of the Church. The solemn tones of the chant swelled throughout the church, the Dies Irae, the Libera, and the others.
