Right Hon. Jos. Chamberlain Dead

(Special to The Ontario) London, July 8d.-The Right Honorable Joseph Chamberlain, for many years an outstanding figure in British national and international politics, died last night at his home in Princess Gardens, S.W. Mr. Chamberlain succumbed to heart failure after a protracted illness which for years debarrated him from an active part in public affairs. He was gradually sinking since Tuesday but the members of the family had preferred that his desperate condition should not become publicly known.
