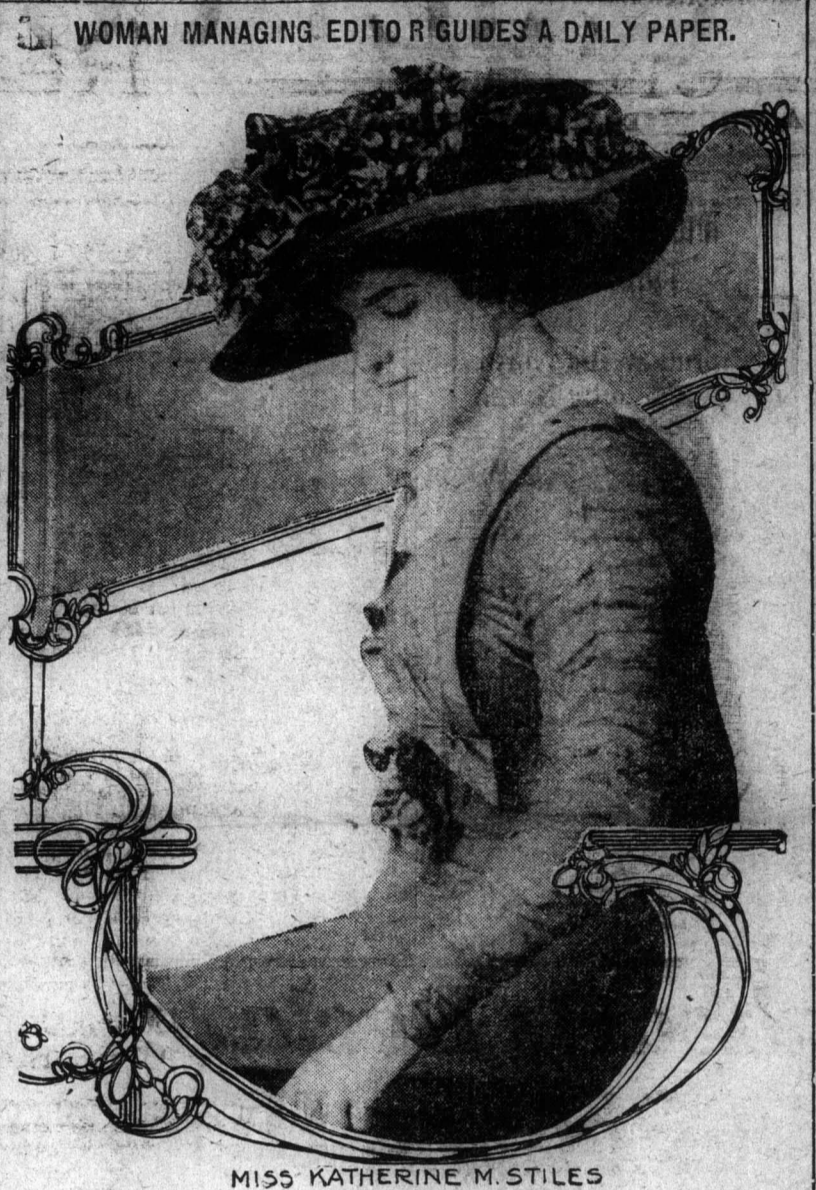

**Bird Life Shown In Splendid Views**

Under the auspices of the Burrough's Nature Club of this city, a very instructive lecture was given by Mr. Albert Pratt of the Burrough's Nature Club of New York, in the Congregational Church.

Mr. Kilmer, P. S. I., was chairman and introduced the lecturer who presented himself to be most entertaining, both by the pleasing manner and the interesting way in which he handled the subject—Useful Birds and their Service to Man.

Splendid stereoscopic views of bird life, the speaker's clear, added greatly to the pleasure of the evening. Mr. Pratt divided his lecture into three

parts—the insect-eating birds, the birds that live on weed seeds, and the rodent destroying birds.

He showed the value of birds in the preservation of the food supplies, and how the life of man depended upon the birds destroying that which in a few years would make the earth almost a desolate plain with the necessities of life. The interesting lecture was closed by some interesting views of the home life of Mr. Burroughs, America's great naturalist and philosopher.
