

VICTORIA'S FIGHTING MEN

List of Those Who Have Been Recruited for the War.

A Splendid Body of Men With Records of Which They May Very Well Be Proud.

Victoria, Dec. 12.—Tonight at ten o'clock Victoria's third contribution to the forces of the Empire in the South African war will march out of the drill hall in James Bay and proceed to the wharves, where they will embark for the trip East.

The process of recruiting men for the Canadian Yeomanry was not completed until some time after going to press yesterday afternoon, and the names of the men selected for the service could not therefore be obtained for yesterday's issue.

In the latter test they were examined by Sgt.-Major Mulcahy and Corp. Caven, while in riding they were examined by Corp. Clarke. After the thirteen men had been selected they were lined up and briefly addressed by Lieut.-Col. Holmes.

REPORTS ON NEGOTIATIONS

Amount of Work Accomplished by U. S. Commissioner.

Tells of the Result of His Labors in Assisting to Settle the Chinese Affairs.

Washington, Dec. 11.—The long expected report of Special Commissioner Rockhill to the secretary of state on the results of his work in connection with the Chinese negotiations in Peking has been submitted to congress along with the full text of the protocol which has been already published, and a mass of detailed statements.

The shooting test for the men was most satisfactory, the smallest score being 31 out of a possible 50. The minimum to pass was 30. Some of the men scored 40 and 45.
